Winston Churchill once wrote :

"Some people's idea of free speech is that they are free to say what they like, but if anyone says anything back, that is an outrage."

As we move from the depths of "lockdown" and into a new world of social distancing and shielding, the use of electronic media is likely to be ever more important and active. May we use it to benefit each other and avoid the pitfalls of thoughtless and hurtful words.

As we go forward, questioning what has happened, and considering how to become the new community and society, let us remember the exhortations of James and the Bible – that the words of the tongue reflect the person inside. Let us really think about what we say – and the way we say it.

Uplyme - Uganda - United - Update

As we begin to ease lockdown in our lovely village, consider what life must be like if you lived in rural Uganda. Little clean water and sanitation, limited access to hospital miles away, little transport, basic accommodation. They have also had higher than average rainfall recently which has meant landslips and



damage to crops. So hunger and loss of life and livelihood, threat of water-borne disease, in addition to all the other challenges...including Covid-19. 'The East African country has confirmed 457 coronavirus cases, with zero deaths, and 72 recoveries,' reported by Africa CDC on 2.6.20. Kigezi continue to work with local communities to help change lives and situations. Here is their report: (written in April 2020)

"This year the team from the Kigezi Diocese Water and Sanitation Programme (KDWSP) have been working in a number of communities

KAATO GRAVITY FLOW SCHEME

The Kaato gravity flow scheme is one of the biggest projects we have ever attempted. Once finished, it will supply twelve villages and over 9,100 people with clean water from two springs. These springs will be connected to 74 tap stands by almost 20 km of pipes.

This year the community:

- built two collection boxes to tap the springs
- built two large reservoir tanks to store water (with a third under construction)
- built two of the five break pressure tanks (that help regulate water pressure)
- added 36 tap stands
- laid over nine kilometres of pipes

But our work in the community goes beyond the gravity flow scheme. It began with a baseline survey of over 1000 households. The survey helped us identify the following issues for the community:

- A lack of water
- · Degraded land quality making it harder to grow crops
- Landslides
- Hygiene challenges particularly people not using latrines
- High incidences of waterborne diseases

So KDWSP have provided community members with training in hygiene and sanitation to help them understand how diseases spread and why good hygiene is important. We have also run training on sustainable land management to help the community restore the quality of the soil. Finally, we helped the community set up committees to manage the work and maintain the scheme in the future.

LAND MANAGEMENT IN NYAMABARE

In Nyamabare Parish, we have been helping communities learn to manage their land sustainably. Following our training on land management and '**Farming God's Way**', we have provided support for community members transforming the way they use the land. So far they have built:

- 21,900 sq meters of bench terraces: these will reduce soil erosion, prevent mudslides and provide farmers with stable land to farm on.
- 14,000 sq meters of drainage channels and 34 percolation pits: these will channel and catch
 water during heavy rains, ensuring it seeps into the ground. This will reduce erosion, improve soil
 quality and maintain groundwater reserves.
- 14 energy saving stoves: these require less wood for fuel, so reducing the number of trees people cut down.

The communities are using what they have learnt to reverse the effects of soil erosion in two gulleys – repairing damage to the landscape. Thirty-four local farmers have also set up demonstration gardens to help their neighbours learn about Farming God's Way. This will help them protect their soil, use less water and produce more food.

COLLECTING RAINWATER IN IHEMBE

Ihembe community sits on a hilltop about 2500 meters above sea level. Recently the community has been growing as people from the valleys move to escape the effects of landslides. But being on the hilltop has its own problems - community members faced a 5 kilometre round trip to collect water. That was before we provided training and support to help the community build rainwater collection tanks. **So far they have built 84 tanks, providing clean** water for 406 people.

OTHER WORK

As well as assisting with community projects, we have been working on other sources of clean water too, including: **9 institutional water tanks:** these are large rainwater tanks built for schools, health centres, churches and their communities. Almost 3000 people are benefitting from them.

20 protected springs: these are springs where a small tank is built around the water source. This protects it from being contaminated, while still allowing the stream to flow. Almost 5000 people in 20 communities are benefitting from these."

Hello to everyone in the Axe Valley Mission Community.

I have been holding you in prayer throughout lockdown and trying not to get too upset that the arrangements for my move to be with you there, are postponed at present.

I have been delighted to see the online content being produced there, as well as centrally at the Cathedral and diocesan input too. We are all learning about the joys and challenges of zoom and online streaming! It's also great to see the caring that's going on.

As a ministry team here, in the Avon Valley Churches in the New Forest, we've been incredibly busy. I have



oversight of three churches in our group of seven and have been working with others in the communities to ensure that everyone who may be isolated or vulnerable for any reason is cared for.

We set up Local Support Groups and in one village set up a Helpline number. We've also got 'care-rings' going on with people keeping in regular phone contact with others in their church community. I've played my part in delivering prescriptions and shopping and other tasks.

We've also been broadcasting a Thought for The Day and services... it's been an incredibly busy time and I've had my moments of feeling overwhelmed with it all but I know that the God who made and loves us, is always there, to comfort us and inspire us to keep going!

We also launched Behind the Hedge, a scarecrow competition, to help raise spirits.... And I attach a photograph of one to make you smile. The creativity involved has been astounding.

It is heart-breaking to see the way the Foodbank here, and nationally, is needed more than ever and I get first hand experience of this when I volunteer, once a fortnight.

Looking to the future I am hopeful that our attitude to the care of God's world will forever be changed following this? It's exciting to see people growing their own fruit and veg and



gardening at this time. In our garden, the rhubarb is doing well and beans, courgettes, tomatoes etc are all getting going now!

I am very much looking forward to being there with you, when it is safe and possible to do so... may we all find comfort knowing that nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. Amen.

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Lockdown Bible Course

One of the ways members of Uplyme Church have responded to lock down has been by doing a Tom Wright online course on the meaning of the cross.

Tom Weight, is a leading biblical scholar and perhaps the most important apologist since C S Lewis. He was Canon theologian at Westminster Abbey, then Bishop of Durham before becoming Research Professor of New Testament and early Christianity at the University of Andrews. He is currently at Wycliffe College in Oxford. He "knows his stuff".

In 2016 Tom brought out an important new book "The Day the Revolution Began", in it he challenges us to rethink the meaning of Jesus' crucifixion. Something happened on Good Friday as a result of which the world is a different place. It was not just about "going to heaven when we die", Wright tells us. If something did happen which makes the world a better place that really would be good mews.

We are able to do this course by a screen share on ZOOM. The course began on 18th June and may have ended before you read this but the latest session will be available on the Church's Facebook page.

Churchill said, "Never waste a good *crisis*". None of us, are enjoying the present time. But being locked in does gives us a chance to do things, which we say we don't have the time to do. Getting a better understanding of the Christian faith is certainly one. How much do many of us really know about the Bible. Do we know more about Islam or Buddhism than Christianity? It may be some time before we can go back into the church building and perhaps we can organise other similar courses in the months ahead If we do details will be on the church website and in future editions of Parish News

WALKING ROUND OUR EIGHT PARISHES ROUSDON AND COMBPYNE

It is Friday 22nd May 2020 and we have been in lockdown since 23rd March. I can now drive for a walk and I have decided to do one of my late wife Liz's walks at Rousdon and Combpyne. As I set off I think " Liz had walks around all our parishes, so perhaps I should walk them all and report to the Parish News". I set off at Dowlands House and am soon walking through the



Rousdon (Peek) Estate. which when we arrived in Uplyme in 1993 housed Allhallows School. complete with its own fire engine and farm buildings. It also had a cricket ground with a brickbuilt pavilion where Uplyme and Lyme

Regis Cricket Club would play matches on the dates of the Village Fete and Horticultural Show. Sadly, the school went bust not that long after our arrival and the grounds are now an attractive residential estate with most of the buildings converted to residential use and the main building divided into three apartments. The fields remain and there were some young cattle grazing as I passed by the former school chapel along the public bridleway which runs through the estate. There are lodges at either end of the tarmaced bridleway and I passed the eastern one into a track that leads to a tiny hamlet called Charton (only half a dozen houses).

At a T junction, I turn left along the country road to and across the main Lyme Regis to Sidmouth road and follow the road ahead until I turn left along another country road towards Combpyne. The hedgerows are resplendent with buttercups, pink campion and foxgloves with a few remaining bluebells in shady areas. I soon arrive at the hamlet of Combpyne and walk down to the small church of St. Mary the Virgin, with the village pond (quite large) on the opposite side of the road. I turn round and walk along the road towards Rousdon before turning off at the Manor house and following a footpath uphill through a grassy meadow to some arable fields which are just showing the green shoots of a crop. After following the path through two fields I emerge again at the main road by the Pinewood caravan and chalet site and cross over again on to another country road ahead. After arriving at some stables I turn left on to a track (public bridleway) with cultivated fields on either side. I was surprised to see four fields of broad beans on this walk, one in full flower, another almost fully grown and the other two only a few inches above the ground.



As I make my way along the track I also see several fields of winter barley which seems to be doing well and another field of green shoots just emerging. Before long I arrive at the road from Axmouth to Rousdon and turn left back to **Dowlands House** and the car. The walk is just over four

and a half miles and took me one hour 50 minutes at a steady pace with a couple of brief stops. Full details and a map can be downloaded from the Lyme Regis website **www.lymeregis.org/walking.aspx** As Liz had walks for all the surrounding areas, I will not have to do any complicated map reading so plan to provide a walk at all our parishes in the Parish News over the coming months. Next up might well be Chardstock, one of my favourite walks. If you are considering doing this walk, I should mention that the red telephone box at the start point has disappeared but the small lay-by is still there on the left and Dowlands House is immediately ahead of you as you park. 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India 1977 – Hope in Darkness.

As Programme Controller for the Christian Broadcasting Association Seychelles, I was on an audience research visit in Delhi. My host was an Irish missionary to University students in that city, one of whom had been a drug addict.

This lad had begun to experience the freeing power of Jesus Christ when he was tricked into smoking a powerful 'joint'. He fell into a deep depression and committed suicide. "I AM THE RESURRECTION AND THE LIFE. HE WHO BELIEVES IN ME WILL LIVE, EVEN THOUGH HE DIES; AND WHOEVER LIVES AND BELIEVES IN ME WILL NEVER DIE."

The old uncle stopped, turned to my host and asked if his nephew had believed in Jesus Christ. "Yes, most definitely" said my host who, on saying this, was warmly embraced by the reassured old man who departed, comforted in the belief that one day, he would see his nephew again.
