# WALKS AROUND THE EIGHT AXE VALLEY CHURCHES NO.4 – CHARDSTOCK

The walk around Chardstock is one of my favourites although it is quite short. This may be because I sourced it myself rather than it being one of my late wife Liz's many walks. Taking the road from Axminster towards Chard, we turn left at Tytherleigh, signposted Chardstock and after about half a mile we come to first the primary school and then next door the village hall (see photo) both on the left. We turn into the village hall car park and park here for free.



We walk out of the car park and turn left and the first building we see on the left is the post office which appears to be in the front room of a detached house (see photo). We are now in the main street and we follow it down past the George Inn on the right and very soon on the left is the impressive parish church (see photo). Almost opposite the church is a

footpath sign and we follow this lane for a hundred yards or so to and through a pedestrian gate into a field on the left. Cross this small field diagonally(white ducks in an enclosure) to another gate into a large field and cross this and two further fields straight ahead. The final field goes steeply down and



across to a bridge over a stream. Cross this into a footpath amongst trees and bushes uphill to a gate into a narrow field. Cross this straight ahead to a gate or stile into a road. Turn left here and soon keep left at a fork down past some houses on the right to another wooden bridge where the stream might flood. Keep walking along the road now uphill past Farway Farm on the right and at the top of the hill turn left on to a signed footpath which begins along the drive of a house on the left. Enter and cross diagonally right to and over a stile and continuing in the same direction to a gate in the hedge and into another field. Cross this to the left hand corner where you will enter a pleasant path between trees (signed) and following the footpath signs continue until you emerge at another wooden bridge alongside the road.

Cross the road here to a footpath sign alongside the stream and follow the stream for fifty yards to a pedestrian gate into a field. Cross this field



diagonally left through a gap in the line of large bushes and then from the top of the hill continue down to a gate in the left-hand hedge. Go through the gate and turn left along the lane and uphill. When the road forks go right and follow the lane until it meets a road at a "T" junction. This is the main street again and if you turn right here

you will soon be back at the village hall car park. There are some good views on this walk, the stream is attractive and the lanes apart form the main street are very quiet. There are often a few cows in the fields and I have encountered two very well behaved horses in the first field after Farway Farm.

# **UPLYME**

#### WELCOME TO THE REV. A.W. AND MRS. PARKE

(as reported in the Bridport News of 14th September 1883)

It is not often that the quiet people of this village of Uplyme exert themselves far beyond the general routine of life, but on Thursday evening they felt called upon to turn out in their best, and make a grand demonstration as a hearty Many will remember years ago, the kindly welcome to their future rector. expression and good wishes that were made towards this gentleman's mother when from the rectory the village folk gave her away in marriage, but not more appropriate or heart-felt than the welcome her son back to the old residence to carry on the good work of his grandsire (the Rev. C.W.Ethelston), in obedience to his last "will and testament," and surely if the same spirit continues that greeted him on his arrival he must find it a pleasant duty. All the inhabitants of Uplyme seemed to have turned out to welcome the Rector. Early in the afternoon the bells in the old church tower rang merrily, and many willing hands were busily engaged in erecting triumphant arches across the street, and making the road to the vicarage (now The Devon Hotel - Ed) look gay with flowers and flags. Over the vicarage door was a pretty festoon of ferns and choice flowers, and across the road was erected a high arch of flowers and evergreens with the motto of white letters on a red ground "Long life and happiness to the Rector and his Bride." Further down the road was a string of flags, and on the plain beyond the bridge was another arch of evergreens, flowers and flags, with the word in bold characters "WELCOME." Here a large number of people had assembled long before the happy couple had finished their journey by rail. The school children were brought up in lines each side of the way, the boys on one side, the girls on the other, each holding a bouquet of flowers while the band of the artillery volunteers played lively airs. About six o'clock the carriage and pair that had been sent from the "Cups" Hotel to fetch the rev. gentleman from the station was sighted, and as it came up to the crowd a tremendous "Hurrah" was given, while rice, and the flowers carried by children, were all thrown into the carriage; the horses were taken out and ropes attached to the carriage and manned by a large number of ready hands, who with comparative ease, to the tune of "England's Heroes" conveyed the Rector to his new home. All along the route flowers were thrown into the carriage and on every hand they were greeted

with a graceful bow or a pleasant smile. Outside the Vicarage the road and the filed above (now Barnes Meadow - Ed) were thronged with people, and among those present we noticed Mrs.H.Tucker, Miss Gifford, Miss Landon, Mrs. And Miss Pullman, Mr. S.Fowler, Mr. Webb, Mr. Frodsham, Mr. Harrold, Mr. Tucker etc. On alighting at the door it was some time before the rev. gentleman could be heard to speak for the cheering. He said he did not know how to thank them for the kind and hearty reception they had given him and his wife on their arrival. He may have thought of many things in connection with his coming to Uplyme, but he never thought of such a demonstration as this. He assured them that he could not find words to thank as he would like for the kind greeting they had just given him; however he hoped that the same kind feeling would continue and that he should remain with them long to enjoy it (cheers). As the Rector was about to retire Mr.M. Lanton asked him to say just a word to the children, who had so kindly come out to meet him, that they might have something especially to remember. Mr. Parke thanked Mr. Lanton for reminding him, but said he was at just as great a loss how to thank them for their kindness, and he was sure he did not know what his wife would do with all the flowers they had brought her, however, he hoped all the children would grow up as handsome as the "relics of Eden's bowers" they had scattered so profusely at his feet. After bowing a graceful adieu, amid the continued cheering of a large crowd of people, the happy couple retired. The Rev. A.W.Parke is from Henbury House, Wimborne, and his coming here as the rector has been looked forward to for years past, and our sincere wish is that he may live as long in the village, and be as much respected as his late grandfather the Rev. C.W.Ethelston.

Wow! Victorian journalism at its most effusive. We don't behave quite like that these days. The Rev.Alfred Watlington Parke of Henbury House, Wimborne, married Hilda Winifred Fort of Read Hall, Lancashire on 19<sup>th</sup> June,1883. Presumably they then had three months of honeymoon before Uplyme gave them this royal welcome. It was a very happy marriage, blessed with three children, and which lasted 60 years until Hilda died in 1943. Mr Parke was a much-loved Rector of Uplyme for 36 years.

# **A Remarkable Pilot**

On the Sunday morning of 6<sup>th</sup> December, 1912, Rev. Alfred Watlington Parke was preaching in Uplyme Church where he was the incumbent. Grandson of Mr Ethelston, Parke was Rector of Uplyme from 1883 to 1919. Ethelston and Parke, grandfather and grandson, between them served Uplyme for an astonishing 84 years. In the congregation that morning would have been Hilda, Parke's wife. She was the mother of Wilfred of whom a contemporary wrote, "*He looked one straight in the eye and spoke as if there was no contradicting him, but then finished up with a wink and a grin. He had a face like a polished rosy apple, with a forelock of hair that flopped down over his forehead."* 

Though he had been born on 1st April, 1889, Wilfred was no April fool. He had a passion for flying, then in its infancy. Orville and Wilbur Wright had made their historic first flight at Kittyhawk in 1904. Wilfred followed in their flight path a mere seven years later. He started to learn to fly at the Avro School at Brooklands. When he was only 22, he made his first flight. It seemed he was just a natural aviator, possessing boundless enthusiasm and an agreeable disposition. In his short but distinguished life, he flew 29 different planes and became one of the leading test pilots of his day. In addition he kept detailed notes of his test flights, an invaluable source of information for historians. Wilfred Parke became a Lieutenant in the Royal Navy (remember that the Royal Air Force did not exist at that date). Every weekend he used to rush off to fly. This did not go down too well with his naval superiors but he argued successfully that the more flying he could get in, the more useful he would be to the Navy when the time came for naval aviation to become a reality. Then on that fateful Sunday in December, 1912, while his father was preaching in Uplyme, Wilfred took off from Hendon in a Handley Page Type F monoplane for a flight to Oxford. Over Wembley his engine stalled and dived into the ground, killing him and his passenger instantly. Only 23 when he died, Wilfred had flown no less than 29 different aircraft in 20 months, made 477 flights, covered 2,424 miles in circuits, plus 2,384 miles cross country and given flights to 167 passengers. Wilfred Parke was a very distinguished pioneer test pilot. He is commemorated by a stained glass window just below the pulpit in our church and is buried in our churchvard. The fine Reredos behind the altar commemorates his mother, Hilda.

# **Uplyme Connections - Parke & Ethelston**

We had a visitor in church on the first Sunday after Easter. Patricia Mallett has remarkable and unique connections with Uplyme .She is a direct descendant of Rev C.W. Ethelston, the Rev A.W.Parke and Sir John Talbot, all of them distinguished names that we remember well in Uplyme. The Rev. Charles Wicksted Ethelston was our Rector1842-1873. He married in 1822 Anne Peel. When she died on 6th January 1854, he built a school next door in her memory, which opened in 1873.and flourishes to this day.

The Ethelstons had a daughter Ellen who married Charles Parke who had a son Alfred Watlington Parke, grandson of Mr Ethelston, our Rector 1883-1919. His wife was Hilda (née Fort) and they had two boys, Wilfrid, the aviator, 'who was 'killed by the fall of his aeroplane' on 15th December, 1912 as his father was preaching in Uplyme Church. We have a very fine window in his memory immediately in front of the pulpit. The other brother was Richard who is the father of Robert Parke (still living), Patricia Mallett's uncle..

That is one line. But here is another line. Major General Sir William Parke (brother of the afore-mentioned Charles Parke) married Anna Maria Nepean and they had a daughter Dorothy Eden who married a man called (improbably) Somerset Arthur Sherston. They had a son called William Edric Sherston who is the father of the aforesaid visitor to Uplyme, Patricia Mallett. Phew! It's a bit complicated, isn't it? But it doesn't end there. Somerset Arthur Sherston's mother was Edith Talbot, daughter of Admiral Sir John Talbot of Rhode Hill.

So Patricia Mallett deserves to be given the freedom of Uplyme Church, Rhode Hill and the Talbot Arms!

- Time to check canes are in good condition for next year
- · Get your seed order in early to avoid disappointment
- Order compost now and keep over winter. Then you are ready for the growing season next year.
- Wash pots and labels ,store in dry shed or storage area.
- Bring in plants to greenhouse for overwintering.
- Check you have no slugs or snails lurking under lips of pots or trays.
- When hostas have died down .Sprinkle grit on top of pots to prevent slugs and snails damage
- · Label all plants with a good label and use a permanent marker pen.
- Time to share gardening books this winter.Bring them out, put in a bag to quarantine.So other people can pick them up form you.
- Why not consider writing your garden tips in the parish mag these always make good reading
