Given a new website was the highlight of March, here's to making sure April is a bit more exciting!

With restrictions lifting, things are looking up once again. Having done a survey of the Scouts, it appears their biggest wish is to do the simpler things in life that they've been missing so much – cooking on fire, whittling wood, having fun on our grass sledges. Of course, this summer we want to put together a bumper programme for all the sections to make up for lack of Scouting over the past year, our leaders are currently coming up with some brilliant ideas, and I think the young people have a lot to look forward to.

My best advice for those wanting to get stuck in is just go for it! It really is a brilliant thing to do. As ever, if your family wants to get involved, do get in touch. Hopefully there might be some better news in the May edition. Meanwhile, just a reminder of our "state of play" now and before March 2020 when we were an integrated part of our very special village.

Some facts about Help at Hand

- Started September 2014 with an initial planning meeting
- Currently we have over 55 volunteers
- 45 villagers were being helped before Covid hit
- · Around 20 volunteers were doing regular visits, which have been replaced by phone calls
- Many people were helped with transport also not possible at the moment

Zoom talk – 'British Owls' April 28th (Wednesday) – join at 7pm for a 7.15pm start

Chris Sperring MBE, Conservation Officer for the Hawk and Owl Trust, will look at the natural history and practical conservation of the UK's owl population. He will discuss everything from basic biology to ecology and practical measures to conserve owls. By way of a spin he will also look at the recent decrease of nature throughout the UK and the world by using the owls as predators and indicators of the health and wealth of nature that they live amongst.

This year Chris celebrates 30 years in his post and brings a lifetime of knowledge and passion for the natural world. He received the MBE in 2001 for services to nature conservation and dedicates a lot of time towards helping local wildlife community groups. In his sparse spare time Chris writes and records his own music.

Summer Flower and Produce Fair set to go ahead on 10th July

We're pleased to report that the 2021 Summer Flower and Produce Fair is to be held on **Saturday 10th July 1-5pm** at the King George V Playing Fields – so nice to look forward to one of the main village events of the year. The Show Schedule with full details of classes and how to enter will be available from local shops in the next few weeks.

As usual, the show will feature a wide range of flower, fruit and vegetable classes with some classes for children and crafts. There will also be charity, commercial and demonstration stands for people to enjoy and a fun dog show. In addition, the Society will be organising a plant stall as it is unable to hold its regular Plant Sale in May. The scope of entertainments is yet to be determined, depending upon Covid-19 restrictions at the time.

To make the show Covid safe, all competition entries will be housed in the show marquee this year, to leave the Village Hall free for cream teas and catering. There will be a one-way system in the marquee, which will have some open sides to ensure a good airflow. Stalls will be well spaced around the playing fields to allow plenty of room for visitors and hand sanitisers will be in place in the Village Hall, show marquee and on stands.

Society members have already claimed their potatoes for the Potato in a Bucket competition and fuchsia plug plants to grow on for the show. Lavender plug plants (lavender is this year's' theme) will be distributed at the end of April. We thank Groves Nurseries for supplying the plugs.

Bullying claims at East Devon District Council ...

Reporting pretty much the most disturbing headline I have shared since my first election.

On 4th March, East Devon District Council Scrutiny Committee received a report from Chief Executive Mark Williams. The report included claims that new councillors and/or the new political leadership are "seriously mistreating Officers", "unnecessarily micro-managing" and "causing extra workload" for staff.

EDDC has traditionally been an organisation where staff morale has been high. In September 2019, the council was described as an organisation with a 'strong track record of successful delivery'; 'strong financial management'; 'high quality services' and a 'hardworking and committed workforce.' In a 'Peer Review' conducted by the Local Government Association.

In January 2020, the Council was awarded Platinum 'Investors in People' status - the highest level achievable, following six years at Gold level (the previous highest status). The report was extremely complimentary "..effective people management and development...", "...high levels of engagement" has "...delivered higher levels of performance" enabling "...an outstanding and well run council, which provides great services and outstanding opportunities for East Devon"

Spring 2020 brought us not only the COVID pandemic, but also a change in administration.

You may recall that, as Portfolio Holder for Finance, I was part of an Independent Administration until May 2020, when this administration was replaced by the 'Democratic Alliance' made up of Councillors from the East Devon Alliance, Liberal Democrat and Green political parties, together with a small number of Independents. EDDC is now led by ClIr Paul Arnott, with Council Chair ClIr Cathy Gardner. The two are also Leader and Chair respectively of the East Devon Alliance political party.

The Chief Executive reported in June 2020 an optimistic' feeling within the council, at the end of the first period of lockdown. However, the latest February 2021 staff report, noted optimism no longer so apparent, with the Chief Executive highlighting several issues, including allegations of bullying.

In the Scrutiny meeting the Chief Executive confirmed that he himself felt bullied at work. Cllr Arnott replied that he was "certain my Cabinet are innocent of any bullying."

My colleague in 'The Independents'*, ClIr Geoff Pook, (Beer and Branscombe), shared concerns that the most upsetting and serious claims from staff did stem from last year's change in administration by asking ClIr Arnott a series of direct questions.

- Does the Leader accept the outcome of the report and that 18 of our staff state the new political leadership are seriously mistreating our officers, which Is very stressful? This includes seven members [of staff] who say they feel bullied, intimidated and are being harassed.
- 2. Does the Leader agree that this is totally unacceptable?

- 3. Does the Leader agree that, as Leader, he is totally responsible for the deplorable actions of his administration?
- 4. Does the Leader agree that those responsible must consider their positions and, as Leader, he should address this?
- 5. Does the Leader agree he holds ultimate responsibility for the actions and behaviour of his team and should perhaps consider his own position?

The Council Leader, Cllr Arnott surprisingly responded by offering a "blanket no" to all of Cllr Pook's questions. He added the phrase 'new councillors/new political leadership could refer to new councillors from all political parties', and that there was no proof or indication from where problems are coming.

Our County Councillor, Ian Hall (also a District Councillor representing Axminster) asked the Chief Executive whether he felt bullying was still going on, and whether he personally had ever felt bullied?

The Chief executive responded 'Yes' to both questions.

Since the meeting I have used my Facebook page to make quite clear the current situation at East Devon District Council is unacceptable, further the Leader's responses to Cllr Pook's questions were "dismissive and disturbing".

* For avoidance of doubt, I am not part of the Democratic Alliance, the current administration, rather enjoy an informal association of true independent councillors.

'The Independents' are Cllrs, Jess Bailey (West Hill & Aylesbeare), Susie Bond (Feniton), Paul Jarvis (Budleigh & Raleigh), Geoff Pook (Beer & Branscombe), Chris Wright (Exmouth Littleham) and I. None is a member of any political party.

We do not accept any form of bullying, under any circumstances and have called upon Leader Cllr Arnott to review his answers to questions raised by Cllr Pook - We await his response....
