# Music 2020-2021

It hardly needs mentioning that last year was a difficult one for development, because of the constraints of the pandemic. I know that a source of continuing regret for congregations is that they are still unable to sing in church. It underlines the fact that an

essential part of worship is being able to express our praise of God through music. May we be able to resume our singing very soon.

Despite the lockdowns, we were grateful to Bruce and Eunice for organising online singing sessions on Friday evenings and both, together with Em contributed to our YouTube services. These services meant that, despite being deprived of singing in church, watchers could give full vent to their voices online without being heard!

Services resumed in church in early August, in time for Rev Nicky's first Holy Communion. Between August and early November, we continued to hold services although opportunities for music were extremely limited. We were, however, able to record a service for Remembrance Sunday just prior to the latest lockdown with a small choir. My grateful thanks to Bruce, Eunice, Elaine and Charles.

Thankfully, the traditional Christmas service of Lessons and Carols was able to go ahead, although with a vastly reduced and of course muted congregation. Our quartet from Remembrance Sunday was augmented by Emma and Maurice and we were able to sing a selection of carols for choir and well-known hymns as usual. The choir also sang on Christmas morning and both their contributions were much appreciated by those present. We have reformed for Easter Day and look forward to real live participation, on this feast of all feast days.

Sadly, the Festival Choir have not sung since my last report, but Adrian and I hope that this will be remedied soon.

Thank you to all who have provided live or online music during the past year. We are so fortunate to have a group of talented musicians at Uplyme, and we are well-placed to develop our various styles of live music in whichever direction post-lockdown and a 'new normal' may take us. One specific aim is to continue to develop the Worship Band and its repertoire and, with the help of Simon, our Youth Worker, to further encourage young people to take part in our services on a regular basis.

#### **Pastoral Care**

As with music, the development of our pastoral care programme was greatly affected by the various lockdowns. We are extremely grateful to David Jones who ably organised our church members into groups with designated people to phone each group member on a regular basis, and this continues to date.

There are several church members who do not have access to the internet, and in order to keep in touch with the church in addition to phone calls, with David's help I was able to organise fortnightly telephone services at 4 p.m. on Sundays, following the format of the Uplyme evening service. At the January lockdown they became weekly, although following the resumption of live services in church at Easter, they will alternate with the AVMC Zoom services from 18<sup>th</sup> April.

Over the past year, pastoral care has always been an agenda item on the regular Wardens' Meetings. We discuss in particular any who are in need through sickness, being housebound or any other type of need, arranging support where possible.

In normal circumstances, pastoral care will include supporting the sick, isolated and bereaved; preparing/supporting/following up baptisms, marriages; supporting those with relationship difficulties; working with new members, taking home communion. Now that we are members of the Axe Valley Mission Community, we shall, in the future, be discussing with all our churches a common approach to pastoral care. Whatever the outcome, we still need to remember that we are all given pastoral responsibility for each other with the command of Jesus: 'love one another as I have loved you'.

# **Worship**

Firstly, a big thank you to all those who take part in our worship in many ways. We are indeed fortunate to have a strong team who are willing to give their time in helping others to worship God. During this unusual year, special thanks to those who created and ran the YouTube services, appreciated by so many. Be assured that great deal of unseen work is involved. Thanks also to the 'Tech Team' whose expertise both online and in church has ensured that our worship has continued to be accessible to many.

The Worship Team have continued to meet regularly during the year, despite the various lockdowns. We always begin with prayer and Bible Study, in order to focus our minds on God. We were delighted to welcome Rev Nicky at our September meeting and have appreciated her experience and input.

Clive, our Team Rector suggested terms of reference for the Worship Team and provided a draft. The resulting document, briefly summarised below, has seen the formation of a Worship Committee which plans our liturgy and music. It reports to the PCC.

The main aim of the Worship Committee is to work with the AVMC Ministry Team, Uplyme PCC and Uplyme Worship Team, in order to maintain and develop appropriate patterns and styles of worship within the Parish and on-line, which encourage and enable as many people as possible to come to know and glorify God.

# Its objectives:

To promote worship which is Spirit filled and glorifying to God To support the parish through prayerful reflection on its various worship needs. To seek to recognise, respect and cater for the breadth of traditions of our congregations

To promote a range of worship that is welcoming to all.

To promote worship which seeks to be attractive to those who have limited experience of faith and church.

To promote worship which seeks in particular to nurture and encourage children, young people and families

# Its specific tasks include:

- 1. To plan the liturgical and musical content of services
- 2. To monitor and review services in conjunction with the Worship Team, working to ensure a high standard, both in regular services and on special worship occasions.
- 3. To seek to reach out to the wider community through worship.
- 4. To be aware of developing patterns of worship, and to consider their adaptation for the work and worship of the parish.

# The Worship Team's specific tasks include:

- 1. To encourage and support each other in the ministry of leading and speaking.
- 2. To contribute creative ideas on liturgy and music.
- 3. To review services in conjunction with the Worship Committee.
- 4. To develop biblical and liturgical knowledge and take part in training activities where appropriate.
- 5. To discuss any issues affecting the operation of the rota.
- 6. To meet on alternate months, or as circumstances require.

As we return to regular services in church, there are many imponderables: will people return? What form will our services take? How will we continue to use online services? I am confident that under Clive and Nicky's leadership, supported by other clergy, lay ministers and our lay team, we shall move forward in hope and expectation to wherever God is leading us.

Mrs Ethelston's School in Uplyme is part of Acorn Multi Academy Trust (MAT). The MAT consists of Primary schools and Nurseries: Primaries: Axminster, Loders, Mrs Ethelston's. Marshwood, Membury, St Andrews,; Little Acorns (nurseries) Axminster, Loders and Chardstock. We have an excellent Chair of the MAT in Brian Impey, also a member of our church in Uplyme.

Last year, at Mrs Ethelston's, we were looking for two more Foundation Governors to represent the Church within our Local Governing Board. We have been delighted to welcome Bruce Roberts and Elaine King to our board. We now have a joint chair, Corinne Hales and myself, two parent Governors and four foundation Governors. I have no doubt that Elaine and Bruce will offer excellent contributions to the Board.

This year has been a challenging year for the school with home schooling, teaching key workers' children in school and now, at the time of writing, thankfully all children back in school once more. The Governors have kept in constant touch with the school during this time, both through local governing board meetings with Katy Lyons, the Head Teacher, and through our monitoring visits. Although we have been unable to visit in person, we have interviewed children and staff via zoom and observed lessons via zoom throughout times of home schooling. The children are remarkably resilient and the staff at the school have worked tirelessly not only on ensuring academic progress but also ensuring the children's well being. This is a particular focus now all the children are back. Children's activities have included various socialising exercises within the children's bubbles, so that sharing skills and negotiating skills are developed alongside academic work. PE has taken place in the playground where children's enjoyment is evident as their excited voices often ring out. Hopefully, as lockdown restrictions ease we shall be able to visit the school in person and volunteers will again be able to go in to listen to readers and offer other activities too.

# **Safeguarding**

Although for most of the past months since the previous APCM Uplyme Church has been closed and linked groups and activities have been put on hold, as safeguarding representatives for Uplyme Church ,we have managed to conitinue to update procedures.

The Uplyme Church Safeguarding Policy Statement, the Parish Domestic Abuse statement and the Policy for safe photographing of children have all been renewed and agreed by the PCC.

Previously we would send in a yearly safeguarding audit to the safeguarding team at Exeter Diocese. Moving with the times we have now accessed a digital Parish Safeguarding Dashboard which gives us instant access to areas that are green, amber and red. We have moved from Level one of the dashboard to level two. Rather than a yearly audit this can be accessed and updated throughout the year.

We are in the process of updating safeguarding information on the Uplyme Church website and undertaking DBS verfications that need renewing for volunteers and PCC members as required. Any new members to the PCC, following this annual meeting, will be required to undertake a DBS check and a basic level of safeguarding training which can accessed online. The DBS checks need renewing every five years and safegaurding training needs updating every three years. If anyone has any questions or queries please do contact one of us.

Vibe 2.5 – After retreating back onto an online forum in January the group have been through a range of different subjects including sex and relationship, creation care and how to build spiritual maturity. This has been made possible through inviting additional adults to guest speak. One of those being Izzy Sibley from Crossroads Church who lead one of the sessions on creation care. We have also been joined by Alison also from Crossroads who has agreed to join us as a supporting adult. Many of our young people already know Ali from other Seaton-based youth work. We plan to reconvene face to face sessions on Sunday 11<sup>th</sup> April and take the group away on residential in June to North Devon.

Vibe have done an incredible job in terms of engagement, some of whom really battled through fears of coming together online. Our boys especially have made great strives in their faith thanks to their willingness to partake and respond to my input and challenges.

Explore (Older Teens): This smaller more intimate group of older teens have continued to flourish with the additional opportunities Nicky and I have presented them with. They continue to have a real desire to interactive with each other and us. They have been encouraged to test out their giftings and been given a platform through the 'All Age' services at Uplyme to do this. We have expanded these opportunities to the older Vibe members as well. The feedback received from these services have helped us develop these individuals further. Nicky and I plan to offer these young people additional training in communication, presentation and research to support their continued growth.

We plan to include Explore in our proposed residential in June, but because many of them would have already broken up from school/college in June we will give them a few days prior/extra before Vibe join us for the weekend.

Personal CPD – I continue to attend monthly CPD sessions online as provided by SWYM. These have been extremely useful and I will share all my findings in an online shared folder with the church.

Thank you so much for your continued support in prayer and emotionally backing me via your encouraging comments and emails.

I want to make an extra special mention to Nicky who has come in and supported me brilliantly. Given me the space to create opportunities for our young people and allowed me to focus on the needs of our youth. Nicky is fantastic with the teens and has already built a fantastic rapport.
