
Ephesians 2:10

However, on a positive note, we can visit each other in the garden. Perhaps we will find a way to have small groups in some accessible gardens. We are working on it!

Cake for visitors

I thought perhaps you might like to try this favourite recipe of mine, appreciated by all age groups especially grandchildren! It freezes beautifully and needs no baking, just melting of chocolate and butter. You can cut it into small pieces as its very rich, wrap then individually in foil and freeze until you are expecting visitors for coffee.



Belgian Chocolate cake

- 1/2 lb dark chocolate
- $\frac{1}{4}$ lb butter
- 2 eggs
- 2 dspns sugar
- $\frac{1}{2}$ lb shortcake biscuits, crushed (I put into large food bag and crush with rolling pin)

200gm carton of French glace cherries (I prefer the dark ones)
Raisins and cranberries in similar quantities to cherries (I do not weigh but use cherry carton to measure!)

Put broken biscuits and other dry ingredients into large bowl. Halve cherries. Beat sugar and eggs. Melt chocolate and butter then add to beaten egg and sugar. Pour onto other ingredients and stir well. Put into loose bottomed cake or flan tin (about $9\frac{1}{2}$ inches or 24 cm diameter) and leave in fridge overnight. This freezes very well.

Eco Corner

With the lockdown easing and the country getting back to the new normal, a lot has been said about building back better and greener. PARISH NEWS WALKS UPLYME NO.2 – LYME REGIS AND RIVER LIM

This walk is actually No.1 in my late wife Liz Jones' Series of Commemorative Walks which can be found on www.lymeregis.org/walking.aspx or www.uhatsoninlyme.co.ul/U3A.htm (walks). I have just turned round the narrative to start the walk from Uplyme Village Hall Car Park. If you would like a helpful map to accompany this walk it can be downloaded with the narrative (from Cobb Gate Car Park in Lyme Regis) on either of the above websites. I think it is one of the best and most varied local walks. For those of you interested in my monthly community walks, I am intending to hold a grand reunion walk at 10.30 am on Saturday 22 May (when we can meet up to 30 people outside, providing the government's roadmap is on track), and thereafter on every 3rd Saturday of the month. Notices will be posted around the Village soon. I am also proposing to do longer walks around the parishes of the Axe Valley Mission Community and details will follow.



We start at the front of the Uplyme Village Hall (see photo) and enter the King George V playing field (footpath sign) pass in front of the new cricket pavilion on your right and follow the right hedge over a bridge and through a pedestrian gate into a field (signed East Devon Way). Follow the footpath straight ahead up and over the field through a gate in the corner and turn left into a road (footpath marker). Go straight over the crossroads (Wadley Hill), keeping left past a country lane entering from the right. Follow this road past Holcombe

Granary on your right and under the iconic railway viaduct (see photo) and turn left through a gate on the left (bridleway sign) just before a white house. Cross the field ahead towards a house and go through the gate (bridleway marker) and along path beside the house into the road ahead. This is Happy Valley and leads into Cuckoo Lane. Follow the road for about a quarter of a mile and just past two cottages on the right you will see footpath sign and steps leading into woods on the right. Here you have a choice, if you are prepared to have a short but steep climb up to a stile into a



field and then following the left-hand field hedge over a stile on the left and then cross two more stiles before turning right on to a road then the footpath is for you. If, however you prefer to avoid the climb and the stiles you can continue along Cuckoo Lane for another fifty yards or so and turn right into a road at a T junction. This will soon bring you to the point where the other route joins the road.

At the crossroads at the end of the road go straight over to Ware Cross taking care as you are crossing the main Lyme Regis to Sidmouth Road. Follow the road past Ware

Barn on the right and Ware House and Ware House Cottage on the left and when the road bears to the left turn right down private drive to Crow's Nest (it is also a footpath). Follow the track to a wooden sign for Coastal Path on the left. Take this path and at a T junction turn left along coast path and through a gate to the National Trust sign for Ware Cliffs. Take the path to the right and after a while before the leaves are on the trees you



may get sight of the historic Cobb Harbour with Golden Cap in the distance (see photo) and at cross paths take one to the right marked Lyme Regis The Cobb 1/2. Follow this path to a gate in the right-hand hedge (not straight ahead) marked The Cobb 1/4. Go through the gate and down the stepped path to the Monmouth Beach Car Park. Turn left past the Bowling Club and along the sea front to the Cobb Gate Car Park which surrounds the commemorative clock. Cross Broad Street between the ironmonger and bookshop ahead and into the Broad Street

Car Park. Walk to the far end and take the footbridge to Town Mill and Riverside Walk. After the footbridge go straight ahead past the Town Mill on the left and immediately left into a narrow pathway which leads to the Riverside Walk. Take care here if you have young children with you as to the left there is a long drop down to the river. At the end of the Riverside Walk go straight ahead into and along Mill Green. At the bottom of a rise you will see a path ahead alongside the River Lim. Follow this path with river on your right and go over the footbridge and turn left along the road (Jericho). At the end cross straight over into Windsor Terrace and follow the River Lim to and straight over a crossroads into a tarmac drive.

Where the drives turns to the right take the footpath straight ahead. Follow this footpath over a footbridge and into a field . Cross the field straight ahead to a gate, over another

footbridge and turn left passing an old mill on right (with mill wheel) and onto a wooded elevated path along the river. Again here there is a steep drop to the left. At the end pass Honeysuckle Cottage into a road (Mill Lane). At the end of Mill Lane pass between Brookside on left and Waterside on right to and straight across a road into "The Glen" (footpath sign). Followed this wooded path to another road go straight across (footpath sign) and follow Aubrey's Way to the main Uplyme to Lyme Regis road with the (Talbot Arms on left (see photo). Turn right and cross the



road following the path back to the Village Hall Car Park.

This walk is approximately 5 miles long and should take between 2 1/4 and 2 ¾ hours unless you decide to stop at Lyme Regis on the way. You can avoid the steepest hill and all the stiles by taking the alternative route in Cuckoo Lane. Enjoy!

How to stay safe this Summer

- 1. Avoid riding in automobiles. They are responsible for 20% of all fatal accidents.
- 2. Do not stay home. 17% of all accidents occur in the home.
- 3. Avoid walking on streets or pavements. 14% of all accidents occur to pedestrians.
- 4. Avoid traveling by air, rail, or water. 16% of all accidents involve these forms of transportation.
- 5. Of the remaining 33%, 32% of all deaths occur in Hospitals. So, above all else, avoid hospitals.

BUT:

You will be pleased to learn that only .001% of all deaths occur in worship services in church, and these are usually related to previous physical disorders. Therefore, logic tells us that the safest place for you to be at any given point in time is at church!

A Bible study is safe, too. In fact, the percentage of deaths during Bible study is not even .001%...

Well, we are back with a bang! The Cubs, Scouts and Explorers had their first meetings back after Lockdown just before the Easter holidays. The Scouts had a hike which become quite muddy, and the Cubs had their long-awaited Fireworks night postponed from November. They all really enjoyed being back together and having fun. The Explorers chilled out by the campfire and caught up with each other. The Beavers have returned after Easter, with many new faces.

Over the Easter holidays we ran a Patrol and Assistant Patrol Leaders day giving them the skills to lead their patrols and what it meant to be a leader. Trinity Sunday: Celebrating our God who is Three Persons

Trying to explain the doctrine of the Trinity has kept many a theologian busy down the centuries. One helpful picture is to imagine the sun shining in the sky. The sun itself – way out there in space, and unapproachable in its fiery majesty – is the Father. The light that flows from it, which gives us life and illuminates all our lives, is the Son. The heat that flows from it, and which gives us all the energy to move and grow, is the Holy Spirit. You cannot have the sun without its light and its heat. The light and the heat are from the sun, are *of* the sun, and yet are also distinct in themselves, with their own roles to play.

The Bible makes clear that God is One God, who is disclosed in three persons: Father, Son (Jesus Christ) and Holy Spirit. For example:

Isaiah 45:22: 'Turn to me and be saved... for I am God, and there is no other.' Genesis 1:1-2: 'In the beginning God created.... and the Spirit of God was hovering...' Judges 14:6: 'The Spirit of the Lord came upon him in power...' John 1:1-3: 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through Him all things were made;

Deuteronomy 6:4: 'Hear O Israel, The Lord our God, the Lord is one.'

without Him nothing was made that has been made.'

Luke 24:49 actually manages to squeeze the whole Trinity into one sentence. Jesus tells His disciples: 'I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power (the Holy Spirit) from on high.'

In other words, the sun eternally gives off light and heat, and whenever we turn to its brilliant light, we find that the warmth and life there as well.

How to keep ground coffee fresh

The battle rages: just where IS the best place to store your ground coffee?

Sainsburys, Morrisons, Asda, Marks & Spencer and Ocado are among the supermarkets that advise you keep fresh ground coffee in a fridge or freezer after opening. But Tesco, Waitrose and Harrods advise that you store ground coffee and beans in a cool, dry place such a kitchen cupboard.

Many coffee experts warn that storing your coffee in the fridge is wrong because coffee easily absorbs aroma, moisture and flavours, and can be tainted by fish, meat and cheese.

Martin Isark, founder of the Can I Eat It website, laments: "So much coffee is spoilt by poor storage, which makes the coffee producers want to weep..."

Paul Rooke of the British Coffee Association adds: "Coffee, like many food and drink products when exposed to air, will deteriorate. Cool and dry are the key words; the ideal storage is in an inert, airtight container stored in a cool place.

East Devon goes to the polls, on 6th May ...

Whilst, other than possible by-elections, there are no elections to East Devon District Council until May 2023, this year we can vote in two elections - to elect our representatives to Devon County Council and to serve as Police and Crime Commissioner for the Devon & Cornwall police.

Registered voters can vote in person at the polling station, where social distancing and other safety measures will be in place, or by postal vote or proxy which will ensure that we can all cast our vote in a 'COVID-secure' way.

At the time of publication of this edition, it will be too late to register to vote either by post or proxy. Application to vote by post closed at 5pm on Tuesday 20th April and by proxy at 5pm on Tuesday 27th April respectively. Postal votes were scheduled to be sent out around the 23rd April, so postal voters should now have received their voting packs.

Devon County Council Elections.

Devon County Council elections take place every four years. As from the review by the Local Government Boundary Commission, confirmed by Parliament in March 2016, all three 'Trinity' parishes are within the Axminster Electoral Division.
