The Lord is my shepherd ; I shall not want Psalm 23 : 1

I love Psalm 23. It is such an encouraging and beautiful poem of promise, especially as we come into the pastoral month of September, with its harvests and (hopefully) warmth and gentle winding down of summer. Many people know the short Psalm and really enjoy hearing it.

I recently came across a different version which is equally meaningful and worthy of our consideration. I believe it is translated from a Japanese version.

Psalm 23

Alternative Version

The Lord is my pace-setter : I shall not rush. He makes me stop and rest for quiet intervals He provides me with images of stillness. Which restores my serenity.

He leads me in the way of efficiency through calmness of mind And his guidance is peace. Even though I have a great many things to accomplish each day. I will not fret for his presence is here. His timelessness, His all-importance will keep me in balance.

He prepares me refreshment and renewal in the midst of my activity By anointing my mind with the oil of tranquility My cup of joyous energy overflows.

Surely harmony and effectiveness Shall be the fruit of my hours, for I shall walk in the pace of my Lord And dwell in His house forever.

A famous actor was eating in a restaurant. People asked him to speak after the meal. He said "would someone like to choose something for me to recite ?"

A man tentatively put up his hand and asked the actor to recite Psalm 23.

The actor said he would - if the man would also recite it after him.

The actor recited the psalm beautifully, with expression, depth and real skill.

"The Lord is my shepherd - I shall not want"

At the end the room errupted with applause. The actor then looked to the man who had made the request. Gradually the gentleman stood and with quiet voice and eyes to the sky he began to recite slowly and with real feeling; "The Lord is *my* shepherd – I shall not want" As he concluded the room was absolutely silent.

After a while the actor stood and walked over to the man and said, "Ladies and gentleman, from what you have heard tonight you will realise that I know Psalm 23 but this man truly knows 'the shepherd !"

WALKING ROUND OUR EIGHT PARISHES ROUSDON AND COMBPYNE

It is Friday 22nd May 2020 and we have been in lockdown since 23rd March. I can now drive for a walk and I have decided to do one of my late wife Liz's walks at Rousdon and Combpyne. As I set off I think " Liz had walks around all our parishes, so perhaps I should walk them all and report to the Parish News". I set off at Dowlands House and am soon walking through the



Rousdon (Peek) Estate. which when we arrived in Uplyme in 1993 housed Allhallows School. complete with its own fire engine and farm buildings. It also had a cricket ground with a brickbuilt pavilion where Uplyme and Lyme

Regis Cricket Club would play matches on the dates of the Village Fete and Horticultural Show. Sadly, the school went bust not that long after our arrival and the grounds are now an attractive residential estate with most of the buildings converted to residential use and the main building divided into three apartments. The fields remain and there were some young cattle grazing as I passed by the former school chapel along the public bridleway which runs through the estate. There are lodges at either end of the tarmaced bridleway and I passed the eastern one into a track that leads to a tiny hamlet called Charton (only half a dozen houses).

At a T junction, I turn left along the country road to and across the main Lyme Regis to Sidmouth road and follow the road ahead until I turn left along another country road towards Combpyne. The hedgerows are resplendent with buttercups, pink campion and foxgloves with a few remaining bluebells in shady areas. I soon arrive at the hamlet of Combpyne and walk down to the small church of St. Mary the Virgin, with the village pond (quite large) on the opposite side of the road. I turn round and walk along the road towards Rousdon before turning off at the Manor house and following a footpath uphill through a grassy meadow to some arable fields which are just showing the green shoots of a crop. After following the path through two fields I emerge again at the main road by the Pinewood caravan and chalet site and cross over again on to another country road ahead. After arriving at some stables I turn left on to a track (public bridleway) with cultivated fields on either side. I was surprised to see four fields of broad beans on this walk, one in full flower, another almost fully grown and the other two only a few inches above the ground.



As I make my way along the track I also see several fields of winter barley which seems to be doing well and another field of green shoots just emerging. Before long I arrive at the road from Axmouth to Rousdon and turn left back to Dowlands House and the car. The walk is just over four

and a half miles and took me one hour 50 minutes at a steady pace with a couple of brief stops. Full details and a map can be downloaded from the Lyme Regis website **www.lymeregis.org/walking.aspx** As Liz had walks for all the surrounding areas, I will not have to do any complicated map reading so plan to provide a walk at all our parishes in the Parish News over the coming months. Next up might well be Chardstock, one of my favourite walks. If you are considering doing this walk, I should mention that the red telephone box at the start point has disappeared but the small lay-by is still there on the left and Dowlands House is immediately ahead of you as you park. The photos are of Dowlands House, the start of the walk and the church of St. Mary the Virgin, Combpyne. **David Jones**



The Changing face of Uplyme Church and the Churchyard.

The Church.

Over the centuries churches in England have had to make changes to meet the needs of its congregations and St Peters and St Paul's Uplyme is no exception.

Some changes have been more radical than others and I am aware that a visitor who has not been in our Church for some years may feel a sense of disappointment when they view the radically changed interior. Instead of the steady rows of wooden pews they now see an open Church designed for a multi purpose use intention.



Why the changes and were they necessary ? It's important to realise that changes in our Church have been ongoing since the Victorian times and even earlier.

The Rood screen, the screen which divides the main body of the Church and the Chancel, was added by the Victorians who at the same time removed the Upper platform in the Bell Tower where the Bell ringers stood. In the reordering of 2012 that platform was reinstated.

The Victorians added the Vestry to the rear of the Church so that there would be a facility for a Church Office. A few centuries earlier the whole Church was extended so that the additional Chancel created room for the repositioning of the altar and the Church Organ.

A visitor to the Church will note that we have new Organ without any additional pipes. The Organ in 2014 needed over £60000 to be repaired due to faults in the pipes and its internal workings and every year the minimum sum of £3000 was needed for maintenance. The decision was taken to replace the organ with an Electronic Organ for the sum of £16000 which only required maintenance every five years.

In more recent times under the Reverend Jeremy White a number of pews were removed and replaced by wooden chairs to create more space.

The biggest change took place in 2012, when the pews were removed and a solid oak floor placed over the existing tiled flooring which had begun to break apart and had caused some concern as to its safety.

These changes however have allowed the Church to be used for a multiple of purposes including its use almost on a daily basis by Mrs Ethelstones School.

The school with its ever increasing numbers have no School Hall for any form of Assembly or other indoor activities when the Village Hall is not available.

As well as school use, it has allowed the Church to be used for a multitude of activities rather than it being simply used twice on Sundays for Services.

The Annual Art Festival as well as numerous other social functions have raised thousands of pounds for charities and this has been possible now because of the newly created available flexible open space.

All these changes have only been made after wide consultation and agreement with both the Church Authorities and other interested parties who are there to protect our Heritage, such as the Victorian Society. They have certainly not been done at the whim of a single incumbent.

So there you have the reasons why the Church looks so different. Do come and visit your Church and hopefully you will discover a vibrant Church looking forward to the future.

The Churchyard

In 2015 our Churchyard was officially closed for burials. This is a process which requires Royal Approval and effectively means that no new burials are permitted.

The burial of ashes following cremation is still allowed and the ever increasing number of plaques around the Yew tree bears witness to that.

When a Churchvard is closed the maintenance of the Churchvard becomes the duty of the Local Authority, in our case, East Devon Council and under the agreement with our Church they provide 5 mowings per year as well as taking care of hedges and overhanging trees. We have been told that due to financial restrictions they cannot do anything more.

This of course is not sufficient as regards to keeping the grass under control and therefore the Church has to finance a further 4 cuts a year with a private contractor.

Over the past two years, as Church Funds have been hit for various reasons, including Covid, we have appealed to those who have relatives whose ashes are interred in the Churchyard if they could donate towards this extra cost of maintenance. Each year so far we have raised £800 and that has included generous gifts from the Uplyme Charity for which we are most grateful. Of the 40 relatives to whom we sent out requests only 8 responded which was very disappointing.

What must be realised is that the Churchyard and the Church are maintained solely by the people who regularly come and give financially to the church. We have no outside funding whatsoever. Working parties from those who attend church do the basic maintenance in weeding, painting and extra strimming where needed.

However it is hoped that in 2022 we might follow the example of Axmouth Church and set up The Friends of Uplyme Church who would help to raise funds for solely for the upkeep of the structure of the Church, not for its running costs.

This Group will not be lead by a member of the Church but hopefully by a person in the village who has a real interest in the history of the Church and its essential place in the heart of the Village.

A plan for a disabled toilet in the Church, which could be used by everyone, including visitors, is at the top of our Wish List and plans have been drawn up so that we have something positive that might interest the Friends. Our target is £100k and we have raised £12k as a start which will allow us to draw up plans so that we and the Friends can try to obtain additional funding.

I hope that these brief words with regards to the Church and the Churchyard will help you to understand why changes have been made and why we believe the Church of St Peter and St Paul should and will always be at the centre of the Village of Uplyme.



News from King George's Field

If you regularly use the footpath from the village hall through the field towards Wadley Hill you



will have noticed the new memorial bench near the bridge over the tributary of the River Lim. It is in memory of Geoff and Sue Stevens and has been arranged and paid for by their daughters Anna Bennet and Laura Woodham, seen in the picture. Geoff was born in Corner Cottage, Uplyme in April 1948, the only child of Fred and Dorothy Stevens. Dorothy was the village postmistress and Fred was a postman and gardener at the Devon Hotel. Soon after Geoff was born the family moved to the new post office and home that had been built on Venlake Lane, Ashlyn. Geoff attended Mrs Ethelston's Primary School, and the Woodroffe School, before he moved to London in 1966 aged 18 to join the Inland Revenue. He was a keen cricketer and played for Uplyme and Lyme Regis cricket club as a teenager, returning to play periodically in his 20's and 30's.

Geoff worked for the Inland Revenue throughout his career, latterly in the shares valuation division and as an expert in valuing the goodwill of companies. In 1973, whilst working in Hinchley Wood, he met Susan Millican a fellow civil servant, they fell in love and were married in 1975. Geoff and Sue settled in Surbiton, Surrey and had two daughters, Anna and Laura. The family moved to Grantham in 1992, following a work relocation enjoying a full life and eventually a happy retirement. Sue passed away in 2019 following complications from surgery and Geoff passed away suddenly just over a year later in March 2020.

Laura and Anna felt that a memorial bench here would give them the opportunity to remember their parents in a place they all loved. Throughout their childhood, they visited Uplyme several times a year to stay with their Gran in Venlake Lane. They had wonderful holidays here. Their Gran was very much part of village life, a member of the British Legion and Horticultural Society. They often came to the cricket pitch to watch cricket matches, play in the playground, attend and take part in the Horticultural Society show, play on the tennis courts, and take a walk through the village. They were christened at the village church, and their grandparents are buried in the cemetery there. Despite now living in Kent and Birmingham, Laura and Anna visit Lyme with their families most years and always pop into the village.

Laura said "Our parents were fantastic parents, devoted grandparents and wonderful friends. We miss them immensely but know that being able to come and sit on this bench, dedicated to them, and enjoy the beautiful view, peaceful sounds of the village, and reminisce about happy times we spend here together will be a great comfort."

BATS ABOUT BAT WALKS - SEPTEMBER WILD EVENTS

A series of bat detecting walks are planned at a range of sites in East Devon and West Dorset – the target area for the Grey Long-eared Bat project. Exploring a range of habitats including meadows, woodland, farmland and lanes, these magical moon lit walks will be led by local bat experts. A chance to learn how to identify bats using hand held bat detectors and contribute valuable data needed for monitoring our UK bat populations.

These FREE events are part of the Grey Long-eared bat project, possibly UKs rarest bat, with only 8 known roosts and confined to the southern coast including a stronghold here in East Devon and West Dorset. On the walk, find out more about the project and how you can help in the challenging restoration of this seriously declining bat species.

Adrian also plans to show the harp nets, which capture bats safely and carefully for identification. Will we pick up the Grey Long Eared Bat - known as the whispering bat for its quiet echo location?

Spy on these mysterious flying mammals of the night on a magical bat detecting walk, in search of the rare Grey Long Eared Bat and some of the other 18 UK bat species, with local bat enthusiasts Mary Anne Crafter and Ruth Worsley. Learn how to use bat detectors to help us identify tonights bats on the wing. The Golden Cap estate holds an incredible 15 out of the 17 species of UK bat including the very rare Grey Long-eared bat.

Saturday 18 September, 6.45pm – 8.45pm Hogchester Meadows, Charmouth

Spy on these mysterious flying mammals of the night on a magical bat detecting walk, in search of the rare Grey Long Eared Bat, with local bat enthusiasts Mary Anne Crafter and Ruth Worsley. Learn how to use bat detectors to help us identify tonight's bats on the wing. A chance to explore these glorious meadows as part of Hogchester Farms ambitious rewilding project.

The Grey Long-eared bat project is funded by the government's Green Recovery Challenge Fund and is one of East Devon AONB's 'Elusive Eight' threatened species chosen for nature recovery.

Council apologises for continued recycling & waste collection problems ...

Like other waste and recycling operators across the country, national staff shortages will continue to affect collections across the East Devon District Council area.



This may mean some of us could some weeks see our collections taking place on a different day to normal.

The Council has thanked us for our patience and set out guidance for us to check to see if our collection has been affected.

Any amendments to our collection will be notified to any affected resident via the East Devon 'app'. Amendments will also be posted on to the council website www.eastdevon.gov.uk which will contain the most up to date information.

If your recycling collection has been missed, could you please continue to leave the containers out whilst an attempt is made to catch up. If after 4 days, the collection has not been made, please take the recycling back in and place any extra recycling out bags on the next scheduled collection day in carrier bags.

If your refuse or green garden-waste collection has been missed, please report this to the council via the website. The contractor will try to collect this as soon as possible.

Unfortunately, the 'bulky items' collection service is now suspended, to allow staff to be redeployed to assist with the recycling collections.

National recruitment challenges at this current time mean that disruption to services is likely to continue for the foreseeable future.

£3M revamp planned for East Devon public toilets...



East Devon District Council plans to make a substantial capital investment to ensure the district has clean, modern public toilets in the right places, but at a reduced overall cost.

Consultation on proposals runs until **5pm on Friday, 1** October 2021.

Residents are invited to

share their views on proposals which consider toilet use at each location, possible alternative site uses, and options which could include public toilets provided by businesses or organisations – such as a café with a public toilet or another community facility.

Central Government funding reductions over the last decade have left EDDC facing a £3million funding gap in 2022, unless changes are made in service delivery.

The possibility of 'pay-to-use' facilities is being considered, to contribute toward running costs.

Existing facilities suffer from a lack of investment, are difficult to clean and maintain. Many require major improvement works.

In 2019 the council spent £473,000 running the public convenience service. Of the 30 public toilet sites, 26 are owned and operated by the council and four maintained for others.

This equates to £15,786 a year to look after each toilet block, in maintenance, providing water, toilet rolls, twice daily cleaning and overhead costs.







