



We have begun to raise money to be able to afford the initial repairs, £1797, but in order to have it strike the hour, we have to raise even more - another £2000.





COP-26 Report

It was a great privilege to be able to attend the second week of the COP-26 conference, in support of the re-forestation charity "The Word Forest Organisation". Cop-26 was split into two zones – the Blue where the politicians were meeting and the Green which had tickets for the public with exhibits, talks and panel discussions. All over Glasgow were also fringe events held by many organisations.

Being able to attend a variety of sessions with a mixture of scientists, corporate business and NGO's - we certainly learned a lot – although it was sometimes emotionally tough. The details of the destruction of the environment and climate are hard to hear, especially against the backdrop of past and possible future political inactions.

However key messages kept occurring

- We are all in this together, we cannot stand around and do nothing and the best way to change the world is by making changes and to keep talking about it sharing our concerns and our actions.
- Social justice and climate justice is intertwined. A memorable talk from a Fairtrade coffee
 producer in Uganda (who was using agroforestry to protect her crops from the torrential
 rains hailstorms) brought home graphically how Fairtrade made a huge difference to her
 livelihood.

Of the many people we met, Val Wood-Gaiger was particularly memorable. Having "died"

at 74 years of age, she decided to set up an organisation called "Learn with Grandma". If you are on Facebook do look her up. She's a real inspiration – talking with her we were really taken with one of her phrases. "When God opens a door, it is best to go through it".

By a happy chain of co-incidences, on Monday evening we found ourselves at the Christian Aid event in Glasgow Cathedral. We heard from a broad range of speakers – from visitors from Uganda, Youth Christian Climate Network and even Rowan Williams. Uplyme Church's paper boats were among 30,000 others on display and used during the event. All the speakers addressed Climate Justice. You can watch the event at https://youtu.be/xHq5W6QS2CY. We particularly recommend the Pentecostal preacher at 35 minutes in.

Heading around the talks and events you hear of so much new technology and stories where huge corporations are making a change. If you focus on the politicians, it all seems too little too late.

It feels the task is too great – like trying to turn an oil tanker. But instead consider how a flock of starlings turn – once a few start, suddenly a profound movement takes place.

So, we do not get disheartened or disconnected by the inaction of politicians. We seek out the optimistic stories that people report, **www.wordforest.org/cop26** has many blogs taken from the conference that tell of these great positive movements taking place. And lastly, we talk, talk, talk to everyone we meet, sharing the concern but also the solutions; there are things that we can all do to make the changes that need to happen.



Mrs Ethelston's - New School Project

School funding update

When we last wrote back in June we talked about the development of a fundraising plan for the New School Project and the Bestic Trust has progressed that to a stage now where the extent of the challenge is more fully understood

Having taken soundings from a number of independent sources of funding we are encouraged to believe that it will attract significant sums to be dedicated to bring the project to reality, however it has also brought more sharply into focus that those will only become available to us if significant seed funding is obtained from Central or Local Government.



Post COVID the economic picture is very unpredictable, and the Exchequer will, as the situation begins to stabilise, come under increasing pressure to revert to a more fiscally conservative strategy. In the last Budget the Government pledged to increase spending on Education, so we must be patient and see

whether any of that pledge will be dedicated to improving the school estates. We are hopeful that the greening of school developments may be a driver for that following outcomes of the negotiations at COP26.

That said, The Bestic Trust does not qualify to bid for public moneys to replace a school building, but fortunately the Acorn Multi Academy Trust does, and with our support they will make applications to that end.

The first opportunity to make an application is upon us, it is known as CIF (Capital Investment Fund) and requires a complete business case to be submitted for the project. Submissions are made during December, and awards are given in the Spring, usually late March or early April. AMAT

has been relatively successful in recent years using this process but we do know that this fund is not necessarily designed to finance projects of this scale. The Bestic Trust will appoint and agent to work with AMAT on the submission.

A further source of Government funding more suited to the project is the School Rebuilding Programme (SRP) which has been dedicated to improve 100 schools each year until 2031, however this is not open for application but relies upon referral from by



Local Authorities based on their priority of needs for local schools. We are currently advised that lobbying for referral to this scheme would be premature until an application to CIF has been made. So our priority is to achieve a very high scoring bid in that process even if it does not result in the award of funds Our stated ambition to open the new school remains Autumn 2023, but we realise that may be <u>very</u> ambitious in current climbs. We will update you again in the New Year.

Late Edit

The Bestic Trust shares concern held in the community about the future of the shop, post office and petrol filling station and will work as best it can to make a positive contribution to alleviate the situation.

SOS - Save Our Shop

On November 7th, it was standing room only at the community meeting to "Save Our Shop" in the village hall. Concerned local residents heard from the organiser, Will Thomson, that unless the approved plans for the new school site can be changed to lessen the traffic impact of the access opposite the filling station entrance, the owner of the shop and filling station site will be closing everything on 14th January next year. This will obviously have serious repercussions for all the residents who rely on the shop and can't easily shop elsewhere locally.

By the time you read this, we hope that you will already have signed the petition asking Devon Highways department to reconsider the traffic arrangements for the school site. The Bestic Trust, which is responsible for the planning of the new school building, is already investigating a change of plans. Although there hasn't been a Parish Council meeting at the time of writing, the PC has been fully supportive of the need for better access arrangements in the past, and we can reasonably expect this to continue.

As it will take a long time to get the plans fully changed if we are successful, the group is writing to the site owner asking him to consider delaying the closure until we know the outcome of our efforts.

What else can you do?

If you value this important local amenity, you can write a general letter to the SOS group explaining how the closure will have an impact on you. Simply pop it in the Village Hall postbox in an envelope marked SOS.

You can also write to these people explaining why it's important to you and what it would mean if it closed, but please make sure you post a copy to the Village Hall so we can keep track and compile everyones feedback.

Parish News - December 2021

Since our last article in September, the last three months has seen a period of change for the Parish Council.

New Parish Councillors/staff

The Parish Council are now back up to full strength, with the co-option of Claire Wiscombe in September. Cllr. Wiscombe joins Jo Rawlins and Pete Hackett as new incumbents to the Parish Council; they are already making a valued contribution to Council business and we welcome and wish them all the best in their new roles serving the Uplyme Community.

The Parish Council also appointed a new Clerk to the Council, Zishan Adamson-Drage, who joins us from neighbouring Axminster Town Council where she worked as Deputy Clerk/Responsible Financial Officer – she is keen to get involved in Parish business and has received a warm welcome from Councillors and residents alike.

Christmas!

We are excited to announce that we have recently invested in new Christmas lights and decorations for the village. Former councillor and volunteer, Becky Turner, has kindly given her time to organise this and she will lead a group of volunteers, including Councillors, to put the decorations up over the next few weeks. With Christmas on the horizon, residents are already full of festive cheer; with COVID-19 still present in the parish, we respectfully remind you to celebrate responsibly and continue to socialise safely whilst numbers of cases continue to rise. Keep an eye out for the lights switch on details!

Post Office Closure

Residents will now be aware that Uplyme village post office will close on the 14th January 2022, when the present lease ends. The Parish Council consider the post office to be an asset of community value and continue to assess the options available to enable the service to continue. There are many difficult issues to be resolved, not least identifying a secure location from which the business could be run and identifying a qualified person, or somebody willing to undertake the training, in order to run it. The Parish Council will leave no stone unturned in the quest to maintain a post office service in the village; however we are unable to guarantee a successful outcome. We will have more news on this in the following months.

Flooding

During October, like much of the surrounding area, the village suffered damage and disruption due to the flooding on the evening of the 20^{th} . However, this could have been much, much worse without the diligence and dedication of the volunteer flood volunteers and residents who worked to clear the drains, stone traps, cleaned up the mud and debris left on roads and paths and did this in an organised and efficient way in extremely trying circumstances. The village is lucky to have such people and the Council would like to take the opportunity to thank them for their commitment and hard work.

This was a one-off, but generally you can help prevent localised flooding by clearing up hedge clippings and cut vegetation, as the cuttings flow into and block the gullies. Thank you to those who already clear up their cuttings.

Dog Mess

We ask that dog owners pick up after their dogs as unfortunately there appears to be an ever increasing amount of dog mess left on footpaths and grass verges especially on the River Lim Walk. The Parish Council has put up new signage. Please help us keep Uplyme clean and tidy.

Avian Flu

Heart of the South West Trading Standards Service have advised us that as of 5pm on the 3 November 2021 an Avian Influenza Prevention Zone was declared across Great Britain. This means that all bird keepers in Great Britain, whether they have pet birds, commercial flocks or just a few birds in a backyard are required by law to take a range of bio-security precautions. To assist all bird keepers in complying with the new rules, the biosecurity guidance and self-assessment checklists have been updated and all the latest information can be found at www.gov.uk/guidance/avian-influenza-bird-flu#biosecurity.

Planning

The Planning Committee has conducted site visits, considered and made representation to East Devon District Council on a number of planning applications and enforcement actions. The outcomes can be found on our website under the Planning Minutes or via East Devon District Council website under Planning.

Seaton Jurassic on the rocks...

Seaton Jurassic is likely to remain empty until next Summer, with EDDC pledging to work toward some commercial activity on the site during 2022, to contribute to the Seaton tourist economy until a long-term future for the property can be secured.

The council became responsible for the building on 17th September. This brought immediate financial responsibilities including rates and insurance. This financial situation is further complicated by the requirement to follow funding agreements when the centre was built and investment to address design defects which have come to light.

What happened since 2016?...

Seaton Jurassic opened in March 2016, at a capital cost of £4.2mill. Funders included Heritage Lottery Fund, Devon County Council and Coastal Communities fund.

Devon Wildlife Trust secured a 35-year lease in a shared profit arrangement with EDDC. No profit came to the council, with DWT serving notice to terminate the lease effective 17th September 2021.

How popular has Seaton Jurassic been?

Since opening, promising visitor numbers, including the café and Tourist Information Centre, have not been maintained by the operator.

Building defects?

Significant building defects have been discovered. These need to be rectified before the building can be used further. Subject to timely appointment of appropriate consultants and dependant on works and their approval by council, a recent report to Cabinet envisaged remedial works could start in early 2022 and would take three months.

The future is challenging...

Negotiations with the three principal funders are starting, with the aim of protecting the Council's position against a potential requirement to repay development funding. If not secured, this may expose the council to commercial restrictions on the future potential opportunity for the facility.

Cabinet also recommended, supported by Full Council, that £45,000 be allocated from the 2021/22 revenue budget toward the liabilities of the Council in the current financial year.

The original report to Cabinet envisaged that this would rise to £81,000 in 2022/23, representing the cost of running an empty building. Running costs would be even higher, if the building is used.

Moving forward...

It must be established whether there is a viable future use for the building which would satisfy funders, attract an operator, and justify the expense to rectify the design defect identified in the building.

Options under consideration include.

- A new operator, still running Seaton Jurassic as an Interpretation Centre focussing on the Jurassic Coast. (the EDDC Countryside Team has set out a vision on how this might be delivered in association with the nearby Seaton Wetlands).
- A new us as an Interpretation Centre or more general attraction, not focussed on the Jurassic Coast.
- Marketing the Freehold/Leasehold of the building to the highest bidder, to secure best financial value for the site.

Cabinet has recommended that the possibility of a café type operation trading from the building be explored for 2022 as an interim measure.

A personal view...

As one who devoted an enormous amount of energy working toward getting Seaton Jurassic established, its decay and ultimate demise is a great disappointment. Seaton and our wider area need support for our tourist economy.

I'm pleased that the Seaton Jurassic project has been referred to the Audit and Governance Committee for examination. I support the further inclusion of the project on the workplan for Southwest Audit Partnership (the Council Auditors) for professional attention. In this context, I am particularly concerned by the discovery of underlying design and build defects in such a young building, and how these were not discovered before acceptance of the building?

I would also support a critical analysis of the performance of the operator, Devon Wildlife Trust, to understand key reasons why a proposition attracting 77,000 visitors in its first period of operation was not able to develop that achievement into a successful long term business.

On a happier note...




