



Eco Corner

It has been said that the basics of reducing our environmental footprint are the three Rs: **Reduce, Reuse, Recycle**. But is this enough? To just cut down a bit, try to reuse the occasional plastic bag or bottle, and recycle when we remember to? And yet, we are continually bombarded with advertising and with images on social media, which encourage us to buy more or to travel to more exciting places. The pressure this can put on us can be a cause of emotional and mental strain as we often find ourselves busier than ever. Almost everything we buy has a carbon footprint and much of it is packaged in un-recyclable plastic. Put simply – by buying less we can reduce the rate at which natural resources are used up and the earth is polluted. This is why **Green Christian** invites us to explore a few more Rs which may help us reduce our consumption and find joy in the free gifts God gives us. Keep this list to hand as a reminder to live more simply and enjoy pleasures which cost us, and the Earth, nothing.

Rejoice -Let's take delight in Creation – God's free gift to us. This is all that we need for our own fulfilment!

Refuse-Refuse to believe what the adverts say. You are no less a person because you don't have this gadget or haven't been to that exotic place.

Reduce-By reducing our impact on the planet can we also reduce our levels of stress and anxiety? We can buy less, travel less, and put less pressure on ourselves to have that perfect home and ever-active life.

Reuse-Replace the convenience of single use and disposable items with the love of something which can be reused for months or years.

Repair-Let's look after our stuff and keep hold of the old skills of sewing and repairing. Visit the Axminster Repair Café in the Guild Hall where you can get a whole range of things repaired.

Rent, borrow and share-Let's look after our stuff and keep hold of the old skills of sewing and repairing. Find out if there are workshops near you where you can get your electronic items fixed, and donate old furniture to charities which teach young people refurbishing skills.

Recycle-Recycling comes last on the list because it should be a last resort. Recycling does reduce the rate in which we use natural resources but it still uses a lot of energy for transporting and processing the items.

Axminster Repair Café is open monthly 10am-1pm. A warm welcome is found as well as skilled fixers and menders, whether it is electrical, haberdashery, they will repair it to give new life. We had a great experience last month calling on their services to repair our garden shredder. FAIRTRADE FORTNIGHT

21 February to 6 March 2022

For two weeks each year at the end of February and start of March, thousands of individuals, companies, and groups across the UK come together to share the stories of the people who grow our food and drinks, mine our gold and who grow the cotton in our clothes - people who are often exploited and underpaid. They are the people who are on the front line of climate change.

Fairtrade farmers in co-operatives are not only getting a guaranteed fair price they are also able to benefit from support to protect their crops from the affects of climate change. For example, Fairtrade coffee farmers in Uganda are using agroforestry; planting their coffee plants under trees to protect them from the hail storms and the roots from the trees are stabilising the soil preventing the coffee plants being washed away in landslides from the floods in the area. It is the Fairtrade premium that gives the funds to enable this to happen.

PARISH NEWS WALKS – VIADUCT, SHAPWICK, HOLCOMBE AND PRESCOT PINETUM

I am starting this walk from the Uplyme Village Hall Car Park and suggest that you use the overflow car park at the rear. On leaving the car park turn right along the pavement and at the tennis court cross the road and turn right past The Talbot Arms and continue to the turning for Barnes Meadow on the right, shortly after the War Memorial. Enter Barnes Meadow and immediately go up through the Millennium Copse on the left. The path here is steep but short and can be slippery at times so care should be taken. You will emerge on to a road which you should cross diagonally to the right to some steps. These lead into a narrow footpath which emerges into Whalley Lane. Turn right here and follow the lane to a T junction and turn left here. You will soon see a road to your right. This is Cuckoo Lane and you should follow it past some cottages on the right and a semi-detached on your left and continue on along now Happy Valley, with a steep hill on the left and views to the right.



At the end of this road take the footpath to the right of the right-hand house alongside a fence to a gate and into a field. You will now see to your right the iconic Uplyme Viaduct on your right which formerly carried the railway line between Axminster and Lyme Regis. It is a remarkable example of engineering in the early 20th century. Access on to the viaduct is not allowed. Cross the field straight ahead down to and through a metal gate and turn left along a road for a short distance passing Shapwick House (white) on the left. Soon take first turn right along a lane until you see ahead a metal barrier across the road.. This is the vehicle access to Shapwick Quarry, which provided hundreds of lorry loads of stone for the foundations of Barnes Meadow, which was built on Greensand.. Turn right here and join another road which goes right and then left, parallel to the original one. Follow this past two semi-detached cottages on the right and later on past Shapwick Grange Farm, also on the right.. As you continue gently uphill beyond the farm you will soon see a public bridleway

sign on the right. Go through the gate into the field and follow it slightly to the right over the field and to a gate. Go through this and follow the right hand hedge towards and past a large barn visible ahead to another gate. Go through this and follow the right-hand hedge and then cross the field ahead diagonally right to a pedestrian gate in the corner.

Follow the path to the left through a pleasant glade down to a ford which cross with care and which leads out on to a road. You are now in the hamlet of Holcombe whose great claim to fame is a Roman villa with mosaics (now covered up) and where a rare Celtic mirror was found which is now exhibited in the British Museum. I suggest that you now turn left along the road through this small hamlet, following the road round to the right and uphill to a T junction with Newcastle Cottage on the left. Turn right here and follow the road until a road appears on the left. This is Woodhouse Fields. Before entering this road look over the gate on the right and you will see a good view of the viaduct in the valley. As soon as you enter Woodhouse fields you will see on the left the entrance to the Prescott Pinetum.



This is a delightful small wood, managed by the Woodland Trust which is full of bluebells and rhododendrons in spring and early summer and has specimen pine trees including, I believe, the largest wellingtonia in the UK. A roughly circular path will take you round the wood in a few minutes and then you should leave Woodhouse Fields and resume your walk along the road on the left. Going downhill look out for a shepherd's hut on the left and when you come to a crossroads turn left past a bungalow on your right and then turn right through a pedestrian gate and into a field. As you walk ahead down the field you will be able to see the village football field on the right and the George V Playing and cricket field straight ahead. Go through the gate at the bottom, across the footbridge over the River Lim and following the left-hand hedge, behind which is the Croquet Club lawn, passing the new cricket pavilion on your left you will arrive back again at Uplyme Village Hall. I would allow at least 2 hours for the walk, possibly a bit less if you decide not to visit the pinetum, which would be a pity.

Uplyme garage to remain open until at least April

UPLYME residents have been told that the village's filling station, shop and post office will now remain open until at least April, while a solution is sought for its long-term future.

Owner Dave Ostler had previously announced that the facility would close down on January 14,



but said he would reconsider if action was taken to amend the proposed access for a new school opposite, which he feels will have a detrimental impact on his business.

Proposed changes to Uplyme Road to provide a single entrance and exit point for a new primary school on land behind the village is an ongoing concern for Mr Ostler.

He believes it could pose a health and safety hazard for his petrol filling station due to increased traffic queueing outside, making the entire business – which also includes the village shop and post office – unviable in the long-term.

A meeting was held recently, when campaign leader Will Thomson said the petition had been very well supported and the facility would now remain open until at least April, with Mr Ostler then considering it on a month-by-month basis, as long as he could see that action was being taken to change to access point.

Mr Thomson said: "There's nothing he wants more than to keep the business open for years to come."

Mr Ostler did not attend the public meeting at Uplyme Village Hall, but he met with campaign leaders beforehand to update them on the issue.

The meeting was led by Mr Thomson and the Reverend Nicky Davies, who said she did not want to name scapegoats or assign blame, but find a positive way to move forward.

Martin Whitehead, chair of trustees for The Bestic Trust, then gave a comprehensive background to the school planning application and the issues surrounding the access point.

The Bestic Trust is an independent charity dedicated to making provision for Mrs Ethelston's Primary School and promoting education and wellbeing in the parish of Uplyme.

An outline planning application for the new school building was submitted in 2012, with a preferred option for access to be off the mini roundabout on Uplyme Road. However, Devon Highways objected to this so the application went forward with a new single access and exit point off Uplyme Road.

At this stage, Mr Whitehead said Uplyme Parish Council and Mr Ostler did not object to the plans.

A renewed outline planning application was then submitted in 2015, at which point the parish council and Mr Ostler did object to the access point, but this had already been approved by Devon Highways.

A detailed planning application to finalise reserved matters was then submitted, at which point the Bestic Trust's consultants drew up a new plan to use new cul-de-sac Masters Close, off the mini roundabout, for the access point.

This was also rejected by Devon Highways as it was felt the queuing traffic trying to get in and out of the school site would block Masters Close completely. The trust were also told that access was not a reserved matter and had already been approved in the earlier outline planning applications.

Mr Whitehead said that, following the announcement of the closure of the garage facility, the Bestic Trust contacted its consultants and had been discussing the best way to move forward.

This has included looking into a new plan for an access point off Masters Close, but Mr Whitehead said this was a time-consuming and costly process that could produce other safety issues for the school.

"It's not without its difficulties but it is progressing," he said.

"If they are able to engineer an access point there I think they will have done a wonderful job. It's very tricky."

Mr Whitehead said the consultants were also working on a traffic submission paper to open discussions with the Highway and Traffic Orders Committee, which would bring together all parties concerned.

He said this would look constructively at all of the village's traffic and safety issues, rather than focussing on the access point alone, and could include slowing down traffic in general, reducing on-street parking or creating a zebra crossing.

Mr Whitehead said this could benefit Uplyme long before the new school is actually built, which is not expected to be until September 2024 at the earliest.

"We totally understand the feeling in the village concerning the shop," he said.

"We are very much part of the community and will do everything we can to find a resolution but we do need other parties to be part of finding that resolution."

The trustees also clarified some frequently asked questions regarding the new school building.

The plans include a large car park for more than 50 vehicles, which will include a section of the village hall's existing overflow car park. Permission for this has been granted by the village hall in return for the school car park being open for general community use and events.

There are currently just under 200 students at Mrs Ethelston's Primary School – far more than its actual capacity – and the new school would take a maximum of 210 children, so there would not be a large intake of new pupils.

The trustees said they were committed to retaining the existing school building and making it available for some kind of community use. They do not plan to sell it for development.

What a tree can do for you

That is the finding of a survey by the Forestry Commission, which looked for the first time at the mental health value of our forests and woodlands. Apparently, they save the NHS something like £185million in antidepressants each year.

A spokesman at Mind, the mental health charity, said: "Although many of us feel like hibernating in winter, getting outside in green spaces and making the most of the little daylight we get can really benefit both your physical and mental health."

As ‘PM’ squirms in the Commons, Omicron threat looks to be receding and days start to lengthen, its Council budget time again....

Setting the Council Tax base...

The Council Tax base used for 2022/23 Council Tax bills must be set between 1st December 2021 and 31st January 2022 is based on the position at 30th November. This base defines the number of dwellings on which Council Tax is chargeable in East Devon, and each individual Parish. It is then used to calculate the Band D council tax rate.

The relevant figure for 2022/23 is 60,805 eligible properties across the district, an increase of 721 over 2021/22. This includes 1,316 in ‘Trinity’, made up of 250 in Axmouth, 191 in Combyne-Rousdon and 875 in Uplyme, which will in turn be used in calculating individual parish precepts.

Cabinet recommends draft budget...

In its meeting on 5th January, Cabinet recommended draft revenue and capital budgets for 2022/23 to be referred to a joint meeting of Overview and Scrutiny Committees in mid-January. Recommendations from this joint committee will return to Cabinet on 2nd February and from there ultimately to Full Council for final agreement.

The overall financial picture...

East Devon District Council receives no Revenue Support Grant from Central Government. Our budgets reflect income from Business Rates, New Homes Bonus and Council Tax, but mainly from the ‘fees and charges’ for services the council provides to residents and businesses.

Whilst the council has a large amount of latitude in setting ‘fees and changes’, all other income elements are set by Government in the Local Government Financial Settlement. Provisional sums were announced on 16th December, but only in a one-year settlement, which greatly hinders a local authority’s ability to set future plans. It is quite likely that all elements may be reformed for the budget year 2023/24.

Our previously adopted Medium Term Financial Plan estimated a worrying budget gap for 2022/23 of just over £3million with £2.3m from reduced income from Business Rates and New Homes Bonus, and £0.7m from a deteriorating balance between the costs incurred, and revenue generated by Council services.

It is a legal requirement that each council set a balanced General Fund budget, where money paid out during the year should equate to money received. Current proposals suggest that £323k will need to be taken from General Fund reserve. Should this be

supported, it will reduce the reserve to very close to the bottom of the accepted range. The only other alternatives would be to make savings toward that shortfall within the budget year or increase revenue.

Cabinet was asked to consider a revised increase in the charges for prime East Devon car parks. This would see a charge increase in April 2022 to £1.50/hour, rather than the £1.20/hr already agreed. This further increase would be expected to generate an additional estimated £339k in 2022/23, thereby balancing the budget. It was therefore recommended by cabinet at its meeting on 5th January, together with the proposal for an additional annual increase of a further 10p/hour, in each of the next three budget years.

Draft Budget Highlights...

- Recycling and Refuse contract negotiations are ongoing, to reflect additional crew and vehicles to meet demand increases – Currently envisaged £400k to £600k additional funds required in 2022/23.
- Payment to Leisure East Devon (LED) currently in budget at £944k. To maintain the current level of services may require additional £50k to £100k in 2022/23.
- A pay review for staff across the authority is expected to require an additional budget sum of between £300k and £500k in 2022/23.

Our Council Tax

The draft budget assumes we will be expected to pay a Council Tax increase of £5 per Band D property per annum in 2022/23, toward the east Devon District Council element of Council Tax collected for a Band D property.

This is in line with Government expectations and the maximum allowable under current regulations which would not trigger the need for a referendum.

East Devon District Council collects the overall council tax through our individual Council Tax demands on behalf of Devon County Council (73%), Police & Crime commissioner for Devon and Cornwall (12%), Devon & Somerset Fire & Rescue (4%) and Town & Parish Councils (4%).

East Devon District Council itself receives just 7% of the council it collects from us each year.

Final capital and revenue budgets are expected to be agreed and council tax rates in a meeting of the Full Council on 25th February.



