When you have friends come to visit you, open the window for ten minutes of every hour that they stay. It will help to reduce the level of any Covid particles that may be in the air.







Taking time to mark time

Have you noticed, scanning above the yew trees, the clock on the church tower is marking time again after several years' hiatus? The photo of the cage clock shows what lies behind the dial. The sharp eyed might read that it was presented to the Parish in 1846 by Mrs Peel. And that was quite a gift since the cost of £500 is equivalent to over £40,000 today, for which she could have bought 33 horses or 2,500 hours of work by a skilled tradesman. There are similar clocks still functioning which date back to the 16th

century and clock making was a skill Britain exported world wide.

It took the engineer from Smiths of Derby two days to dismantle, clean and readjust the workings. We are very grateful to James Booth who will wind the clock each week.

The next challenge is to get the bell marking each hour tolling again. While fund raising has been successful in raising £845 so far, that's less than half what would be the total cost of the restoration. So please support future events and give a nudge to any grant giving bodies with which you have contacts.



News from King George's Field.

We continue to try and solve the drainage problem along the footpath through the field. In June we had a temporary ditch dug along the Croquet lawn hedge, which partially solved the problem- thank you to James Booth for this work. We have now taken advice and hope to tidy up this trench and create a French drain which will link to a new drain to be dug and then connect to a previously existing drain. The drains will include a flexi pipe, covered in clean gravel and enclosed in a geo textile membrane and then be restored to grass. The cost of this, including materials and fees to take away excess soil exceeds £4,000. We are most grateful to both the trustees of the Uplyme Community fund and the members of the Uplyme and Lyme Regis Horticultural Society who have agreed to contribute towards the cost of this work. We now await a relatively dry period to allow the work to be undertaken.

Please could I remind all dog owners that dogs are prohibited from being on the field, except for being walked along the footpath, when they should always be on a lead. There have been occasions recently when dogs have been exercised on the field and even tied up at the gate of the children's play park. Please respect this by-law for the sake of all the children and sports players who use it.

We have put up a new sign on the tennis court, made by Creative Solutions to outline the important points about the court and how to book. The current cost is £7 per hour to use the court, which is excellent value for money - why not make it one of your New Year's resolutions to use it regularly?

Remembering Sir Ernest Shackleton

One hundred years ago, on 5th January 1922, Sir Ernest Shackleton, the Irish-born British Antarctic explorer, died of a heart attack in his bunk in South Georgia. He had led three British expeditions to the Antarctic. He was 47.

It is now believed he may have had a hole in his heart. His feats of bravery and endurance were mixed with sudden illness, but he was never willing to have his heart properly examined.

He set a Furthest South record when he commanded the Nimrod expedition in 1907-09. On that occasion he showed acclaimed leadership by refusing to try for the Pole because of the likelihood that he and his men would die on the return journey.

But his greatest achievement was to enable the rescue of his crew after the Endurance became trapped and then crushed by ice in the Weddell Sea in 1915. A long trek, hauling lifeboats over ice, was followed by Shackleton and two companions reaching South Georgia in a small boat – followed by a trek over mountains and glaciers to a whaling station, from where a rescue ship was launched to bring home the remainder.

This has been described as "an utterly unbelievable story of bravery, heroism and endurance". Shackleton was not known to be a Christian, but he and his men said they felt Providence was guiding them, especially during the 36-hour march across South Georgia, when all three said they felt sure there were four of them, and not three, making the journey. *www.parishpump.co.uk*

What is happening to our public loos?

It was George Jennings, an English sanitary engineer and plumber, who in 1851 invented the first public flush toilets. He said: "the civilisation of a people can be measured by their domestic and sanitary appliances."

Yet now, across the UK, public lavatories are in dismal and steep decline. The number of lavatories maintained by local authorities has declined from 3154 to 2556 since 2015.

The effect can be doubly difficult. The Royal Society for Public Health pointed out in a 2019 report that closing public loos imposes a 'urinary leash'; on people who then feel wary of venturing far from home. Also on the rise is the revolting phenomenon known as 'wild toileting', which increased greatly during the pandemic, when public loos were closed.

The Victorians took a philanthropic pride in their public lavatories. How would George Jennings rate our level of civilisation today?

First time buyers

The so-called 'bank of mum and dad' hit a new high in lending last year. Parents who helped their offspring to buy a first home gave them an average of $\pounds 58,000$. Nationally, that meant that parents loaned out about $\pounds 9.8$ billion, according to the estate agent Savills.

The level of first-time buyers who rely on family funding is now at its highest since 2013.

Parish News – January 2022

The Parish Council would like to take this opportunity to wish residents and visitors to the village a happy, healthy and prosperous new year!

Councillor Vacancy

Due to a recent resignation, we now have a vacancy for a Councillor. If you are passionate about the community, and want to make a lasting impact on village life, then this role may be for you. Ways in which to apply will be posted on our website and the noticeboard by the village hall, so keep an eye on these on how to become involved.

Post Office Closure

At the time of writing, a community meeting has been arranged on 20th December at 6pm in the village hall. This meeting is to be chaired by Will Thomson of SOS, and amongst others invitees are the key stakeholders including the Bestic Trust, the businessman Mr D Ostler, County and District Councillors, Parish Councillors and the press. The meeting will be open to all the residents of the parish and its purpose is to update the village on progress to keeping the community amenities of the post office, shop and garage running by exploring all the options. The issue remains a rolling item on the Parish Council agenda, and the next Council meeting is on 12th January, so please join us for an update on progress.

Budget 2022-23

The Council have set a precept of £51,051 for 2022-23. This represents a 0.13% increase on last year's Council Tax, which means an increase of just 14p a week for an average Band D household. This year, one of our priorities is to appoint a Lengthsman to keep the culverts, stone traps, gutters and drains clear following the extensive flooding in October last year. We are also going to make some repairs and refurbishments to the playground. East Devon District Council tax bills will be issued to you around February time, so examine the breakdown of where your Council tax goes for more information.

EDDC extends innovative 'virtual' consultative meeting programme until Annual Council in May.



As Chair of the Council, I led the temporary reintroduction in July 2021 of 'virtual' consultative meetings for the period to January 2022.

Whilst Prime Minister, Boris Johnson was announcing 'Plan B' on Wednesday 6th December, I was proposing their extension to Annual

Council on 11th May 2022.

As Chair, my top priority is the health and wellbeing of all associated with East Devon District Council, our Officers, Members and the public we serve.

In July we found ourselves in the tightening 'jaws', not simply of a COVID pandemic but also a legislative vacuum.

Whilst the excellent COVID-19 vaccination programme continues to reduce hospitalisation and mortality, the data are inconclusive on future risk, particularly with the rapid growth in cases of the Omicron variant as we move into the Winter, a time when peaks in influenza and other respiratory infections can also be expected.

The outdated, 1972 Local Government Act, which underpins Local Government governance, does not recognise 'virtual' meetings as satisfying the requirement to be physically 'in the same room', simply because the act predates Tim Berners-Lee invention of the World Wide Web itself, by a full 17 years.

The enormous level of uncertainty, which prompted our return to 'virtual' meetings, remains. We are particularly conscious that our local health service is under extreme pressure.

In this context, it is important we take all steps to ensure that our potential impact on healthcare demand is minimised, whilst we continue to effectively deliver our services to East Devon residents.

Smooth running of consultative 'virtual' meetings, in support of delegated powers to Senior Officers, demonstrates that we are well placed to extend our use of 'virtual' meetings through the winter and protect the health service by reducing our risk of infection.

We have also achieved several other benefits from our online meeting experience.

- At a time of great financial pressure on Local Government, travel expense claims by Members have delivered cost savings over 95%, with further associated efficiencies through a reduction in travel time.
- Travel reduction also delivers similar saving in our personal carbon footprint, contributing toward a key Council priority of a 'net zero' footprint by 2040."
- 'Virtual' meetings are much more effective, in terms of public engagement, with all meetings both broadcast live and published on the East Devon District Council YouTube channel.
- Instead of rare public attendance at our 'face to face' meetings, 'virtual' meetings may be viewed several hundred times, as our council demonstrates its commitment to openness and transparency.

Extending temporary 'virtual' meetings over the winter period is totally consistent with Government's 'Plan B' instructions to 'work from home if you can'.

We support the Local Government Association, which we understand is seeking reintroduction of legislation allowing for remote meetings. Should such legislation be laid before May, I envisage our practical experience will be of enormous benefit, in allowing us to smoothly 'morph' into a programme of full, decision-making online meetings, as was possible prior to May 2021.

In the interim, I'm grateful for overwhelming council support for the extension of our current arrangements, with 32 votes in favour, 1 against and 7 abstentions.

Our Council is next scheduled to review its temporary use of consultative 'virtual' meetings to be effective from 10th May 2022.

Meanwhile I will be working with Officers, leaders of all political groups and individual Members, to develop forward facing options for the longer-term governance of East Devon District Council's meeting programme.




