



Eco Corner:

Over the next few months, we are going to consider how we can live greener lives. This month we are thinking about Electrical appliances around the house.

Matthew 5:16

In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven"

- You can save money/ and energy just by remembering to turn your appliances off at the plug rather than leaving them in standby mode.
- 2. Take your phone charger out of the socket when not in use. It uses energy even when it's not charging your phone.
- 3. Buy A-rated electrical appliances whenever you can. They may be more expensive initially, but you will save on your energy bills.
- 4. The location of your fridge can make a difference in how energy efficient it is. Make sure it is out of direct sunlight and not close to the oven. Keeping it against an outside wall will help the heat it

generates escape easily, and always make sure that there is a few inches' space all around the fridge so that air can circulate.

 Electrical gadgets are great, but the environmental impact of manufacturing them and disposing of them at the end of their life is high. Think before you buy more gadgets.









JOURNEYS OF FAITH

The Radio Transmitter story.

In his final commission to his disciples, Jesus Christ commanded them to "GO and make disciples of all nations". During the 1945-1985



years, Christians used short-wave radio broadcasting transmitters to send the gospel message globally. This was before the inventions of the Internet and the World Wide Web and Smartphones. At present, FM and other types of radio stations increasingly serve local audiences, free of earlier interference in short wave transmissions

During the 1945-85 period, one such Christian broadcasting mission - the Far East Broadcasting Company, operated from the Philippines beamed their programmes into what were then Communist countries and particularly Russia. Tracing the FEBC radio frequency, Russia would use a powerful transmitter to block the FEBC programmes by broadcasting a noise like a food mixer on the same frequency. FEBC sent one of their staff to the USA to purchase a more powerful transmitter.

Their representative arrived in the USA with a humble budget and attended a sale of very large, powerful ex-Voice of America short wave transmitters. He put in his little bid and was faced with a dilemma when the hammer came down in his favour. How would he ship it home and who would know how to get it operational. That very evening, he received a phone call from the other side of the USA. It was from a Christian supporter of FEBC who was praying behind the published itinerary of his visits to supporting churches. Their conversation revealed that his caller was the retired chief transmitter engineer of Voice of America and member of a wealthy church who simply said "leave it with me".

A few days later, his new friend called him again to say that his church would incur the cost of shipping him and the transmitter and to undertake the installation and re-commissioning of the transmitter. The visitor called to mind God's promise in Paul's letter to the Ephesians chapter 3v20 that God "is able to do immeasurably more than we can ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work in us."





When a little bit more exercise can help a lot

A recent study suggests that for every additional 500 steps you take each day, you may be lowering the risk of heart issues by 14 per cent.

To put it another way, this recent study found that adults who took fewer than 2,000 steps a day were 77 per cent more likely to experience a cardiovascular event in the following three years than those who took about 4,500 steps a day.

"We were surprised to find that every additional quarter of a mile, or 500 steps, of walking had such a strong benefit to heart health," said one professor of epidemiology at the University of Alabama. "While we do not want to diminish the importance of higher intensity physical activity, encouraging small increases in the number of daily steps also has significant cardiovascular benefits.

How more protein could help prevent your midlife spread

Eating more protein can help prevent your midlife spread, partly by suppressing your appetite. A recent study has found that people eat 210 calories *more* per day than when they are on a low-protein diet.

Yet most of us aren't eating enough protein. A study from the University of Sheffield found less than half of over-65s studied met the official UK reference nutrient intake (RNI) of 0.8 grams of protein per kilogram (2.2lb) of their body weight per day – or about 50g a day for a 10st person.

Adding an egg, smoked salmon, authentic Greek yogurt, nuts, or half a can of beans on two slices of wholewheat toast and a 250ml glass of milk, can all help.

The great thing about protein is that it is so filling you might not need to snack. But if you are still peckish, avoid biscuits, chocolate and crisps, and instead choose nuts and seeds, cooked chicken, a bowl of Greek yogurt or a small piece of cheese.

St James, the Apostle to Spain


James and his brother John were sons of Zebedee and fishermen from Galilee the 'sons of thunder', as the gospel writers describe their impetuous characters and fiery tempers.

James stands out on three accounts: he was one of the three disciples who witnessed the Transfiguration of Christ. Jesus took him, along with Peter and John, to 'watch' with him in the garden of Gethsemane. Finally, he went on to be the first apostle to die for the Christian faith, when in AD 44 King Herod Agrippa put him to the sword in Jerusalem at Passover time.

In the centuries following his death, James became associated with the evangelising of Spain, and as a powerful defender of Christianity against the Moors.

The heyday of the cult of Santiago de Compostela was from the 12th to the 15th century, and the pilgrimage to Compostela became one of the most important of medieval Christendom. This in time transformed the iconography of James, and his emblems became the pilgrim's hat and the scallop-shell of Compostela. Over 400 English churches have been dedicated to James.

A series of FREE bat detecting walks are planned at three sites in East Devon AONB area. Exploring a range of habitats including farmland, meadow, riverside and trees on an ancient iron age hillfort. 



The home of Community Champions

Calling all public-spirited residents!

The Council have very limited funds to maintain the amenities in the village, so we need your help! Did you know that if your property's boundary hedge abuts a highway or public footpath/bridleway, it is your responsibility to keep it cut back? Also, if you have trees which overhang the highway or a ditch adjacent to your property, the safety or clearing of these is legally your responsibility. It is very important that any cuttings or vegetation are cleared so they do not clog drains or ditches as this presents a flood risk to the parish and potentially, your own property.

If we all do our bit to help, Uplyme will continue to be a beautiful place to enjoy walking and riding safely.

War Memorial

You might have noticed activity at the war memorial in the village recently. This work was undertaken to clean the locally-quarried ham stone using a gentle steam cleaning method called 'ThermaTech'; it is used to clean off accumulated road grime, atmospheric pollutants and algae. This does this by heated steam being delivered through a lance removing anything on the stone that would leave it looking dirty, thus leaving the memorial in an exemplary state. This cleaning technique the memorial is approved by Conservationists as well as historic England, so that the memorial is protected for future generations.

We would like to thank the nearby resident who agreed to their outdoor tap being used, thereby enabling the work to be carried out.

A couple of the plaques have been temporarily removed to carry out much needed repairs, and will be reaffixed in due course with the traditional lime mortar which will allow the stone to remain in its current condition. The before and after photos below tell the story!
